The editor replied: You are right and the minister who will at all times and under all circumstances tell the whole truth about his member, alive or dead, will not occupy his pulpit more than one Sunday, and then he will find it necessary to leave town in a hurry. The press and the pulpit go hand in hand with white wash brushes and pleasant words, magnifying little virtues into big ones. The pulpit, the pen, and the grave stone are the great saint-making triumvirate. And the great minister went away looking very thoughtful while the editor turned to his work, and told of the unsurpassing beauty of the bride, while in fact she was as homely as a mud fence.

D. H. Jackson is a candidate for re-election as sheriff of Jackson County. He has made a painstaking official and deserves a re-election. The Tribune says that if W. A. Jones is elected sheriff his books will not need experting. Mr. Jones was assessor of this county during the years 1903 and 1904 and made the assessment for those years. The sheriff's office finds that for those two years Mr. Jones made over 200 double assessments that the present sheriff Jackson must straighten out when the dissatisfied taxpayer calls at the office to see why after his taxes have been paid his property is still assessed under some other man's name. The Tribune is invited to the court house and to examine the assessment made by Mr. Jones those two years, and see for itself if this is not the fact. No, W. A. Jones books will not need experting because he will not be sheriff.

REASON.

What would be the result should Jackson county vote dry next Monday? All we can do is to tell what prohibition has done for other counties and presume the same would be true here. Linn county (dry) has every advantage in her favor, but business is dead. One of the largest department stores in Albany went out of business a few months ago. This store had a good business and was one of the best establishments in the city. Trade from this city goes to Salem, 27 miles away, (wet) which is the cause of the quiet time in Albany. It is not the drinking men alone who do their trading in Salem, but prohibitionists as well. The Willamette Valley Co. is building an electric line through the city. With

all this work going on one cannot truthfully say that Albany is prospering. It is safe to predict that Linn county will be wet after next Monday. Taxes, of course are considerable higher, with property on the decrease. These are facts and the same can be verified by business men of Albany.

With as fair a set of officers as ever occupied public position in Jackson County, with efficiency in said officers that has never been excelled, and with integrity which has never been questioned by men who know them, the Tribune persists in traducing them and emits a tissue of falsehood through the columns of its press daily reflecting upon these men. This organ the Tribune—should be dubbed the slanderer of decent citizenship. There has not been a day scarcely since the present editor of this sheet came to Medford that he has not been traducing some reputable citizen of the county, and he is still at it.

His purpose can not however be screened successfully. He is a democrat, is running a democratic newspaper under the mask of non-partisanship and desires above all things democratic success. But will such utterances as he gives publication to avail the democratic candidate—the vituperation which this organ emits in their behalf benefit them? Do these democratic candidates—Neil, Barnes, Dow and the others on the ticket stand sponsor for this sort of campaign? Can it be doubted that they do. They are not found denouncing the dirtiness of the campaign of the Tribune—they do not dis-avow the falsehoods which it daily publishes, and they must be presumed to acquiesce in these unwarranted attacks upon the public men of Jackson county. The sort of campaign put up by the Tribune in behalf of democratic success in Jackson county harks back to the days of the bloody shirt and the unscrupulous methods which were employed in those days to accomplish political success. But do the voters of this day and generation endorse such methods? Will the lies that are persistently published against the officers and which have been proven to be lies, be supported by the ballots of the voters next Monday? If they are supported by the voters it will be the resurrection of a political system through the agency of the Tribune, that was frowed upon and put to death in Jackson county a generation ago.

George W. Dunn as Judge has brought to the office which he holds a business experience which has been equalled by but few men who have ever occupied that position. He has given his time to the consideration of public questions and the application of a business brain to the solution of the problems which must necessarily confront a county judge. He has constructed excellent roads in the county where before his election there were impassable thoroughfares; and no man will pretend to say that any feature of the public service coming under his supervision was ever neglected. He deserves a re-election.

No less is this statement true of the other republican candidates for re-election. Yet they have fallen under the ban and the unscrupulous criticism of decent citizenship. But they will be elected and the rotten methods employed by such organs as the Tribune will be rebuked by the voters of Jackson county. Every republican candidate should be elected by the voters next Monday.

RETAIL GROCERS MEET IN PORTLAND

(Special Correspondence)

The Oregon delegation to the National Retail Grocers Association just adjourned at Boston, won a signal victory in securing the 1909 convention for Portland. When one considers that the retail grocers are more numerous than any other class of business men, it gives an idea of the immense audience of merchants throughout this country who will be interested in hearing from Oregon during the next twelve months.

The Portland Commercial Club moves today into its magnificent new home, probably the largest building of its kind owned by any popular commercial body anywhere. The first luncheon was made the occasion of honoring Oregon products, the menu being as follows:

In addition to this the furniture and fixtures are Oregon-made. The Hood River Commercial Club, through its officers, is asking the cooperation of the commercial bodies of the state in favoring the establishment of Hood River County.

The Los Angeles Bureau of the Portland Commercial Club, under the management of Mrs. Frances K. Headlee, gives a lecture to an average of two hundred people every morning at 11:30.

In addition to this, Mrs. Headlee has spoken before large gatherings, and especially before social bodies in the evening. She was recently the guest of the Ohio Society of Southern California—her address, of course, tells the glories of Oregon. Her daily reports show a great interest in this state, and that a large percentage of travel back East will return by way of Oregon.

The Oregon Development League is circulating 60,000 copies of a four page Dairy and Livestock Bulletin. This contains most effective illustrations and text, a comprehensive story of livestock, dairy and poultry realities as well as some idea of the future possibilities of this greatest of all dairy sections. The Portland Country Club and Live Stock Association and the location of the great packing plants are important features. It is easy to see that almost untold wealth will accrue to the state through the development of this marvelous branch of its growth.

Oregon's advertising has reached every quarter of the civilized world. Late letters have been received by the Oregon Development League from Austria and New South Wales, Australia.

Your correspondent has inside information that there will be all kinds of roses for the great festival which begins June 1st and lasts until the 6th with a program full of interests from the opening moment until the closing hour, with low rates from every point in Oregon.

Ashland is especially prosperous and happy. A line of shade trees to the number of four hundred have been planted on either side of the boulevard leading from the city to the Normal School, and new residences are encroaching upon surrounding orchards.

Astoria covered herself with glory, affording her citizens and visitors reserved seats to witness the passing of the fleet.

Excursion parties from California, Washington and Idaho will be added to those which come from all points in Oregon to Portland during the Rose Festival.
