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ELECTION IS OVER NEIL ELECTED

Much Excitement Over The Liquor Question—Chamberlain Wins

The vote of Jackson County was badly mixed. Men would vote for Cake for United States senator and also for Hammersly and Kubli. Judge Dunn was leading according to first returns but Judge Neil was steadily gaining. Ashland gave Dunn 188 over Neil but the north county was solid for Neil. Jacksonville voted strong against prohibition, 195 against and 96 for. Dunn received in the county 1829 votes and Neil 1976, leaving Neil 147 to the good. Cake was badly defeated in the state, Jacksonville giving him a small plurality. Miller and Purdin 1883, Purdin 1810, Hammersly 1661 and Kubli 1535. Jones defeated Jackson by 444. The county voted dry by 267; the total dry vote was 2118 and wet 1849. The University bill carried. W. R. Coleman for clerk and R. T. Burnett for recorder were elected by good majorities. Cronmiller defeated Taylor for treasurer.

We will probably have the complete returns of the state in for next issue.

The resignation of J. F. Miller as president of the board was accepted, and Dr. J. W. Robinson was elected president and T. J. Kenney was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Mr. Miller.
