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Excessive Freight Rates

Steps should be taken to get an equitable freight rate from Medford to this point. The rate now charged is unreasonable, that is, the rate charged the merchants. This road is a common carrier and is therefore governed by the wish of the people so long as this wish is fair and reasonable.

If the R. R. V. R. R. can haul rock from this point to Medford for 20 cents per ton, why is that general merchandise cannot be hauled for the same figure? A suit is filed in the federal court in Portland by the state Rail Road Commission for this very thing rebating, or giving one man or corporation an advantage over another in reduced freight rates. If the state commission was notified of this fact it is quite probable that a just rate would be established. Furthermore it is very dangerous and unlawful for a freight car to be attached to the rear end of a passenger coach; this is frequently done by the R. R. V. R. R. company.

A five cent fare is ample for the short haul between here and Medford. With this reasonable rate Jacksonville would soon be a city of double the population, and the rail road company would more than benefit by the increased amount of freight handled. No this company don't want to see Jacksonville grow, because if the city was much larger, and made up of people who were accustomed to different transportation facilities, a more modern rail road would pass through our city and carry freight at less than half the present rate and passengers for not to exceed 3 cents per mile and probably less.

Talk to a member of the firm and he will tell you that Jacksonville will never amount to anything which would be a fact if it was in the power of the company. We have the healthiest climate and the most beautiful scenery to be found in any city in the United States. With snow-capped mountains to the east, and a vast stretch of fertile rolling land to the north, west and south, covered with vast orchards of excellent fruit, and then tell us that Jacksonville will never amount to anything? Well!

The Willamette Valley company that is building electric lines in all parts of the state, spend thousands of dollars annually advertising this small town through which they pass. This is an honest company and are not afraid of competition. This company installs electric light and water plants in the small cities and operate the plants at a very small cost to the consumers, as an advertisement for the small towns. They also employ a man, Mr. L. Dasent, to advertise the country along the line, they issue and distribute pamphlets and circulars setting forth the advantages of these cities. When did the R. R. V. R. R. do this? How many electric light and water plants did this company install? WHERE DID THIS COMPANY SPEND ONE CENT FOR THE BETTERMENT OF JACKSONVILLE? In building and maintaining those old shacks called the round-house and machine shops in the heart of the city? I guess not.
