The Record has a full grown ordinance in this issue, which took up considerable of our time and space.

Whenever a lengthy ordinance is handed in we long for a linotype machine, and all hands think seriously of taking a vacation. In looking over the records at the court house we find that the Rogue River Valley rail road is paying taxes on five miles of road-bed at \$10,000 per mile, or \$50,000 for the entire system.

This is less than half the value of the line compared with the rate the S. P. pays, and is not in accord with the methods adopted by the company.

The freight rates between here and Medford is unreasonably high while the amount of taxes paid is exceedingly low. If the company can haul gravel at 20 cents per ton why do our merchants have to pay \$2.00 per ton for merchandise? And on top of this the merchants must pay taxes on \$75,000 which should be paid by the company.
