Word From Cap Evans

EDITOR POST As you are interested in the upbuilding of Jacksonville, and Jackson county and further, since you assumed the management of the county paper you have adopted a straight policy for "boost" and improvement and have always stood for those things best calculated to develop Jacksonville's resources and natural advantages. It becomes a pleasure to lend my feeble efforts to assist you in every honorable way. I undertook to create a great enterprise for Jackson and Josephine counties and I want it distinctly understood that I have in no way abandoned the project. However, as conditions were at the time I left home, I thought it best to let the schemer in Status Quo temporarily because there did not seem to be enough local interest in it which would be useless to undertake the creation of so large an enterprise, and one involving the expenditure of so great a sum of money. The creation of an electric railway line must of necessity derive its support from a local patronage and the extent of that patronage is largely measured by the endorsement given at the time of creation. As for example, if people who are large property holders, and who, being such, will derive the first and most lasting benefits are not willing to assist in the promotion of those things which will naturally increase their own values. Then how would the investor be able to estimate, or even form an opinion as to the support that should be expected from them after the project became a reality. As to the value of such a creation to the Rogue River Valley, there can be no question, and the beauty of the scenic effect, the productivity of soil, the exhilarating effect of climate, the happiness and contentment of the people have been so often told in song and story that further comment is at this time unnecessary. But, sentiment never created anything of commercial value, and has no place outside the home. The development of the natural resources of any country is purely a matter of business. Where dollars and cents are expected for returns, booster clubs are only efficient when they do something other than make a noise. I am interested in seeing the old town of Jacksonville take the place among her sister towns of the valley to which she rightfully belongs, viz the leading place. But if she ever does, it will be because her citizens put some of their money into public improvements, rather than stand in the middle of the street or on the street corners, and only utter condemnations. I wish you would say something to the whole valley Brother Barnes that would awaken a modern twentieth century movement, my best wishes for your success and Jacksonville's prosperity at all time.

EXPOSITION NOTES

The permanent fence enclosing the Alaskan-Yukon-Pacific exposition is nearing completion and in a short time a small admission fee will be charged to visitors.

The landscaping of the grounds of the Alaskan-Yukon-Pacific exposition has been begun and the site is beginning to take on the appearance it will have in 1909.

At ship races will be one of the many attractions at the Alaskan-Yukon-Pacific exposition. The New York Aero club is taking great interest in the matter.

The official flower of the Alaskan-Yukon-Pacific exposition has been definitely selected. It is the Cactus Dahlia, a flower which grows profusely around Puget Sound.

The United States government will spend \$600,000 for its building and exhibits at the Alaskan-Yukon-Pacific exposition. A main government building and structures for Alaska, Hawaii, the Philippines and the fisheries industry will be erected.

In addition to the prizes offered by the management of the Alaskan-Yukon-Pacific exposition for the poultry show which will be held during the latter part of the fair, many valuable cups have been donated by persons throughout the country.

Many national associations are planning to hold their 1909 meetings at the Alaskan-Yukon-Pacific exposition. The handsome buildings and interesting exhibits of the \$10,000,000 world's fair, combined with the unsurpassed scenery and climate of Seattle makes the

metropolis of the Pacific Northwest an ideal convention city.

The management of the Alaskan-Yukon-Pacific exposition is already taking steps to provide against extortion of visitants while in Seattle to see the big fair during the summer of 1909. Seattle easily took care of about 200,000 during the stay of the Atlantic fleet and at no time during the exposition period will there be as many visitors in the city at once.
