**MOTOR BOAT EXHIBIT AT FAIR**

(Special Correspondence.)

SEATTLE, June 27: For the first time in the history of the world's fair the Alaskan-Yukon-Pacific exposition, which will be held here from June 1 to October 15, 1909, will have a large exhibit of motor boats. Henry E. Dosch, director of exhibits and privileges, has now completed plans for the display.

Manufacturers are taking up the matter and their letters indicate that they will put forth their best efforts to have big exhibits. They realize that Seattle is a good market for motor boats, and that more than likely they will be able to dispose of all of them on exhibition and more too by the time the fair closes.

The exposition being situated as it is, with Lake Washington bordering upon one side of the ground and Lake Union on the other, affords an unexcelled opportunity for the demonstration of motor boats. Lake Washington which is the largest fresh water body in the Pacific Northwest, having an area of thirty eight square miles, is piled by scores of power boats at the present time. Seattle has a motor boat club with a strong membership and its pleasure cruises and races are held on Lake Washington.

It is asserted that there is no other city in this country endowed with better facilities for motor boating than Seattle. Besides Lake Washington and Lake Union there are the broad waters of Puget Sound which affords the enthusiast great opportunity. There is both salt and fresh water, and the scenery of all of the waters about Seattle is unsurpassed. The climate is such that motor boating can be enjoyed all the year around.

A pavilion for the motor boat display will be built on piers over Lake Washington in one of the prettiest spots on the exposition's shore line. It will be 100 by 600 feet in size and will be provided with slips varying from 6 by 20 feet to 20 by 80 feet. On the shore side of the pavilion will be exhibited boats machinery and accessories. The exhibitors will be enabled to have their boats in the water for demonstration to visitors by trial trips on the lake.

Motor boat races will be a feature of the sports at the exposition and it is expected that many records will be broken. A motor boat show will be given in Seattle this coming February by the Seattle Motor Boat Club under the auspices of the National Motor Boat Association of the United States.
