GAME LAWS

The deer season opened July 15 and will continue until October 1. The law gives hunters having licenses the right to shoot up to five buck deer between these dates, except in Baker, Coos, Curry, Grant, Harney, Malheur, Umatilla, Union and Wallowa counties. In Coos and Curry counties the open season for buck deer is from July 15 to October 15.

The season for female deer does not open until September 1 and closes October 31. Does may be hunted during this time, except in Baker, Coos, Curry, Grant, Harney, Malheur, Umatilla, Union and Wallowa counties.

The open season for elk is between September 15 and October 15. Only one may be killed by any hunter in a season.

China pheasants, native pheasants, grouse and quail may be shot between October 1 and November 31. In Clatsop, Coos, Curry, Josephine and Tillamook counties, however, the season for these birds opens September 15 and closes November 29. Blue grouse may be shot in Tillamook county from August 1 to October 22. East of the Cascade mountains the open season extends from August 15 to November 30. Prairie chickens may be hunted in Wasco county from August 1 to October 15. The open season for the sage hen and sage cock east of the Cascades is from August 15 to November 30.

Ducks, geese and swans may be shot except in Coos and Lake counties, from September 1 to January 31. In Coos county the open season is from August 1 to January 31, and in Lake county from August 15 to March 31. Water rail and upland plover may be hunted from August 1 to December 31.

The bag limit for ducks is 50 in one week, for upland birds 16 in one day, while for geese and swans there is no limit. The silver gray squirrel may only be hunted between October 1 and December 31.

It is always unlawful to offer for sale, barter, exchange, transport or ship beyond the boundaries of the state of Oregon any deer, moose, mountain sheep, elk, silver gray squirrel, swan, prairie chicken, grouse and all kinds of upland birds and ducks. It is unlawful to hunt without a license.

to kill beaver or spotted fawn, or to run deer with dogs. Night hunting is also prohibited by the Oregon law.

China pheasants may not be killed in Jackson county at any time. Female deer may not be killed in Coos and Curry counties and it is against the law to kill quail or Mongolian pheasants in Grant, Harney, Gilliam, Umatilla and Wheeler counties until January 1, 1912. It is also unlawful to trap or destroy the nests of protected game birds. Shooting on enclosed lands without permission is unlawful, as is also the shipment or sale of deer skins unless they are properly tagged. Tags may be obtained of any justice of the peace or of the county clerk. A hunter's license is issued anywhere in Oregon. A hunter must have his license with him while hunting.

The fine for transporting game outside the state, and for its sale, is from \$100 to \$500 and imprisonment. Violation of the game laws calls for a fine of from \$25 to \$100, and hunting without a license is punishable by a fine of from \$25 to \$100 and imprisonment.

The Cortelyou Club of Brooklyn, N. Y., was represented in Portland Sunday by a delegation of one hundred and twenty-five of its members.

The Cherry Fair at Salem last week was a great success and many were present from Portland and other points.

A contract for \$75,000 for the construction of the foundation of the main building for Swift and Company, to be finished within ninety days, was let last Friday.

The Astoria Regatta, with thirty splendid aquatic events, is scheduled for August 27th, 28th and 29th, and the railroads have made a rate of a fare and a third for the round trip from all points in the state.

The Washington State Press Association enjoyed one of their best annual conventions at Vancouver during three days of last week. A trip up the Columbia River, a trolley ride to Portland and a banquet at Vancouver, were among the features of entertainment.

Judge George T. Baldwin, Vice President of the Oregon Development League, and Mr. W. O. Smith, editor of the Klamath Falls Evening Herald, were in Portland Saturday as a special committee from the Klamath Chamber of Commerce to invite the Y. M. C. A. excursion party which goes to Crater Lake August 7th to arrange their itinerary so as to include a visit to Klamath Falls.

The colonist rates from all points in the East to all points in Oregon commence Sept. 1st and continue until Oct. 31st. Every commercial organization and every citizen of Oregon should begin to make these rates the subject of every letter that goes out of the state. The fare is \$33. from Missouri River points, St. Paul, Duluth and Winnipeg, \$33. from Chicago, with proportionate rates from every point in the United States.

No meeting was ever called in Oregon which has attracted the universal enthusiasm that has been created by the Oregon Good Roads Conference, which is to be held in the Convention Hall, 6th floor, of the Portland Commercial Club on Tuesday, Aug. 11th. The railroads have made a rate of a fare and a third for the round trip for this occasion. Delegations representing every grange, the commercial bodies, and the different counties to be appointed by the county judges, are already reporting that they will be present. Every citizen in the state is a delegate at large, as is the mayor of every city, and every county commissioner.

SUBPOENAS ISSUED FOR SMALL BOYS

Wm. Eaton, a well-known figure on the streets of this city, made an attempt to get the saloon men in trouble Monday when he informed the district attorney that liquor was being sold to minors in the city. After a few minutes of fire from the district attorney it developed that Mr. Eaton had been in the habit of buying liquor for the boys instead of the boys buying it from the saloons. Eaton, who had been refused liquor in the saloons, thought that he would "play even" and cause the saloon men to be indicted, but alas; Mr. Eaton was arrested and placed in jail under \$150 bonds for selling liquor to minors. It is not always safe to peddle information, especially when it is not called for.

Several boys have been subpoenaed before the district attorney and examined for information regarding the selling of liquor to minors. So far no arrests of saloonmen have been made and it is probable that not sufficient evidence has been obtained to warrant action.

District Attorney Mulkey is not a man seeking notoriety, but when the matter is brought to him he must act. He is not a man who is likely to shirk his duty, and when the law is being violated it is his duty to investigate.
