MORE ABOUT WATER

The following communications were received from parties interested in the city of Jacksonville and want to see the city go ahead and take its place among the towns of the state, instead of being held back.

"PUT YOUR SHOULDER TO THE WHEEL."
To the Editor:—Jacksonville is going to have a water system of pure mountain water. At the present time where Cantrell Gulch connects with Jackson Creek there is sufficient water to supply every family in the city. By actual measurement the flow is 25,000 gallons every 24 hours. All we want is a reservoir to hold sufficient water to last two months.

"These are actual facts, no hot air, as the Post said in its last issue. Now it is time to act, don't put it off any longer. We have the right councilmen, let us encourage them in every respect to go ahead with their plans. Our town is improving right along. Mrs. Taylor is building, Chris Ulrich has purchased some more real estate and is repairing the same for renting purposes, Mr. Lundgren is preparing to build and Chas. Dunford will start to build in a few days. Miss Levy has remodeled her residence beyond recognition, Sam Walsh and Lewis Ulrich are repairing their residences.

"Now give every family sufficient water and see how nice our town will appear. Some of our residences and lawns such as have water are beautiful with flowers and truck gardens. I will enumerate a few places: John Miller, Ed Helms, C. C. Beckman, Mrs. Rose Harbough, J. Nunan, Mrs. Taylor, Peter Applegate, Chris Ulrich and Harry Lay. Just look at these places and see what a beautiful city we would have if we were supplied with water.

"With all these improvements going on will we turn down the water proposition simply because there are a few of us old 'moss backs' who have lived here all our lifetime and have sufficient water? I say no. I say once more let the community go ahead and give their encouragement—go to the city and hear what is going on and if you have anything to say, say it. Don't wait until they have adjourned and then commence. I say let us work together and do it at once and say we are going to have water."—An Old Moss Back.
