## BARNUM'S EXPRESS

Would you believe it if you saw it? Not the jerk-water running between here and Medford, but a real express wagon and a team of horses, owned and operated by the Rogue River Valley steam railroad. As to whether this outfit was bought to take the place of the steam train remains a question yet to be learned, however it is a great improvement.

If this corporation is permitted to crush the life-blood out of an honest man and his business a radical change should take place in the laws of our state. Charles F. Dunford has been operating an express and dray business in this city for several years and has developed a good business, and has invested every dollar of his earnings in businesses and enterprises to help develop the town. Now that he is, in an honest way, handling the bulk of freight between this point and Medford Mr. Barnum will seek to take from him the local drayage business.

No, indeed the business interests of this city will not tolerate such actions, and today Mr. Dunford is handling more freight between these two points than at any time since the Blue Ledge closed down. Men who were not in the habit of patronizing Mr. Dunford have requested him haul their freight in the future, which signifies that the people do not believe in letting one man monopolize the freight business. It is Mr. Dunford who keeps the freight rate down to an honest point, as he will go to the freight sheds or business houses and load the freight on his wagon and deliver it to your door or cellar and not charge you one cent cartage, while the R. V. R. R. charges the same rate over their line and adds cartage at both ends. So on 100 pounds of freight Mr. Dunford will deliver it to your door for 50c less than the railroad charges. Oranges, lemons, candy and nuts are delivered on the team in much better condition than on the train, because on several occasions boxes have been broken into and hands not always clean, plunged into the contents.

Perishable goods arrive in much better condition on the wagon because they are loaded on the wagon fresh and delivered without delay, while the railroad lets the goods stand on the platform of the depot or in the sun for several hours and by the time it reaches its destination it is hardly fit to use.

## POLITICS

The political situation has not materially changed since the two candidates took the stump. Bryan is working hard, as he did in two former campaigns. And if defeated this, the third time, he will try again. There is no question but that he is seeking an office which he cannot fill to the satisfaction of the people. The people do not agree with him on the money question nor his "anti-imperialism" policy. Now the only thing he speaks on is "Shall the People Rule?" This is meaningless for a man applying for the Presidential chair. Shall the people rule? Certainly. They have always ruled, except under democratic administration. I remember very well that during the last seige of democracy thousands of people were ruled. When Wall street wanted more government bonds a request was made to Grover and the bonds were issued. The people were obliged to pay them by taxation. Wall street never paid any taxes on them, government bonds are exempt from taxation. Shall the people rule?
