Reading, writing and spelling, we say it regretfully are no longer thoroughly taught in the schools of the land. Young men and women who seek instruction in telegraphy, stenography and typewriting, although of good ability and general information are lamentably deficient in the fundamental of the English language. They especially can not spell. Out of thirty or forty words in ordinary use sometimes one-half, or even two-thirds are misspelled. The schools no longer give the common rudiments the attention they should—so much attention is given the higher branches before the common ones have been mastered. Especially do they neglect reading. Girls and boys attending the common schools should be thoroughly drilled in reading aloud, to develop the use of their vocal organs not only in reading but in spelling and reciting.
