EXCEPTIONS TAKEN TO AN ARTICLE

"Lend a Hand" a neat paper printed at the State Penitentiary takes exceptions to an article recently published in the Post. The article follows:

The article in question was published in the Post shortly after a magazine solicitor from Portland succeeded in securing 117 yearly subscriptions to a worthless magazine who claimed a circulation of 50,000. The solicitor had with him a neatly printed magazine considerably larger than "Lend a Hand" and claimed the thing to be but one year old. When the thing arrived it was about the size of an "Ayer's almanac and about as interesting to read.

Furthermore the article was not an "Editorial (1)" Nor did it in any manner refer to "Lend a Hand," because the Paper at the penitentiary is in its fourth year and did not have a solicitor in this city at the time the article appeared in the Post.
