**Estimate on Water System**

The proposed water system on Jackson creek will cost \$29,046 and the pumping plant system will cost \$10,000 or a difference of \$19,046.

The detailed figures as furnished by Engineer Rountree follows:  
**JACKSON CREEK**  
Cement to build dam..... 1500 bbls.  
Cement for retaining walls..... 1200 ..  
Cost of cement.....\$12,150  
Amount of pipe required to reach from West side of First at the intersection of California street..... 7,800 ft.  
Cost of pipe.....\$6,376  
Cost of excavation and reservoir..... 8,500  
Laying pipe..... 2,000

**PUMPING PLANT**

With a pumping plant the reservoir does not need to be as large as a gravity system. The tank for the pumping plant will be 100x100x12 feet, and would hold 1,250,000 gallons of water.  
Cement..... 617 bbls.  
Cost of cement.....\$2776.50  
Excavation and laying pipe 3000  
Pump (400 gals. per min.) 475  
Extra pipe required.....871  
Motor..... 1599

Total..... \$29,046

It will be noticed that no provision is made for piping the town in the above estimate as it will require the same amount of pipe for either system.

The estimate on piping the town follows: Five inch pipe 1305 feet, 2080 feet of four inch, 8620 feet of three inch and 4320 feet of two inch pipe, total \$5,459, to this must be added \$2000 for fittings which will bring the amount up to \$7,459. This estimate is for the pipe f. o. b. San Francisco.

A reservoir to hold 10,000,000 gallons would be a pond of water 200 feet wide 300 feet long and 30 feet deep. In order to get this body of water it would require a dam at least 45 feet high. Such a dam anywhere on Jackson creek would endanger the lives and property of every person living along the creek in the lower part of town. The dam alone would cost the town \$50,000. F. M.
