HOW IS THIS?

A drummer who was in this city recently took a collection of samples of job printing from this office with him and put them on display in one of the large supply houses in Portland, and the manager of this institution, who is well advanced in the art of fine printing penned a personal letter in which he said: "I received the samples of color work and I want to say that they are excellent and a credit to any office. If you continue to turn out high-class work such as the samples received, you can't help but build up a good substantial business and handle a class of work in which there is a profit."

It is very seldom that the head of an institution, the largest on the Pacific coast, can find time to pen a personal letter to the small offices and then only when the work is of the highest standard.

It costs no more to have your printing done in this office than it does in Portland and the express is no small item. There was over \$150 worth of printing received in this town last month from Portland, all of which could have been printed in this town and in some instances, in much better form than that received from Portland. Why not build up your home institutions? This money was sent away and not one cent of it will return. Again a drummer came into this city a few weeks ago and spent 35 cents for his dinner and took over \$2.00 worth of job work out of the city. We happened to have the sole agency for the Rogue River Valley from this house for lithograph and embossed work and we know what our commission was. Fifty per cent of this work could be printed here as the samples of work sent out by this house now on file with the Post will verify this statement. In other words we can duplicate some of the work to the letter both in paper and type.

Is it not better to have your home institutions in a prosperous condition than to read upon the door the sign "Closed by the Sheriff?" The sheriff will never close a business if it is in a prosperous condition, and a business cannot be in a prosperous condition unless it receives the support of the community in which it is doing business.

The postoffice will hereafter give preference to married men, and especially men with large families, in dealing out new jobs and passing around the promotions. Rather hand on a young fellow too poor to marry.

Parents do wrong in keeping their children hanging around home, sheltered and enervated by parental indulgence. The eagle does better. It sties up its nest when the young eagles are able to fly. They are compelled to shift for themselves, for the old eagle literally turns them out, and at the same time tears all the down and feathers from the nest. "Tis this rule and rough experience that makes the young birds so fearless in their flight and so expert in the pursuit of prey. True those who live in the country are "Rubes" and "Farmers" and "hayseeds" to the cigarette smoker in town, but the boast of the business men in the world today is that they were born on a farm. Take away the surrounding evils that beset the young men or women on the threshold of life's journey in the city, and substitute the helpful influence of nature, and you fortify them for the sterner walks in life. The few things which they do not know about table etiquette and when it is proper to leave two visiting cards and when but one, they will catch onto much quicker than city boys and girls will learn to properly stroke the furnace or make good bread. No boy or girl need be ashamed of living on the farm, for if they have taken advantage of what it has offered they are well fortified for after life.

A perfect town is that in which you see the farmer patronizing the home merchants, the laborer spending the money they earn with their own tradesmen, and all animated by spirit that will not purchase articles abroad if they can be bought at home. The spirit of reciprocity between man and the mechanic, tradesman and laborer farmer and manufacturer, results every time in making the town a perfect one to do business in. "Perfection" should always be desired even where attainment is barely possible, we presume, but a perfect town must denominate a great rarity until we reach a more advanced stage toward the millennium than has yet been gained.
