**INJUNCTION GRANTED BY JUDGE HANNA**

Holding that the recall amendment passed last June is ineffective and without legislative action providing for the manner of putting it into effect, Councilman John D. Olwell, through his attorneys Reames & Reames, secured a temporary injunction from Circuit Judge Hanna, restraining City Recorder Benjamin F. Collins from calling a special election under the recall petition for his removal filed last Saturday. The injunction was served upon Mr. Collins by the sheriff's office.

Recorder Collins had announced his intention of calling an election Saturday to be held October 15, claiming that there was no other course he could pursue, under the charter. He did not consult the city attorney or the attorney general as to the validity of the recall petition.

These are the facts, which are utterly and absolutely unimportant. The matter of a man's religion has no rightful place in consideration of his fitness for the presidency. The constitution of the nation, ordained and established "to secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity," expressly places the very suggestion of such thought outside the pale of patriotism.

No words can be clearer than these from our country's fundamental law: "No religious test ever shall be required as a qualification to any office or public trust under the United States."

The numerous queries about Mr. Taft's religious belief shows simply the extent to which his enemies have gone to rouse some prejudice against him. Since there was no spot upon his whole clean record of private conduct and public service to which they could point to Taft's detriment they displayed their willingness to descend to any depth of petty, cowardly, contemptible attack that might do him harm.—Philadelphia North American.

The pledge of Jackson county followed addresses on the part of Judge John H. Scott of Salem, president of the Oregon Good Roads association; C. S. Jackson of Portland and Judge Baldwin of Klamath Falls, each of whom instilled in their audience an enthusiasm for better roads, and an intense desire to see the Crater Lake project undertaken and carried to completion.

A number of the representative business men of the valley met the Crater Lake road commission in the rooms of the commercial club and for some hours the project of building the Crater Lake road was discussed.—Tribune.
