LARGE CROWD AT COURT HOUSE

Republican Rally a Great Success—Everybody Enjoyed the Meeting—Twelve Old Veterans.

At the court house Wednesday night, the republicans held their first big rally. It had been raining all day but the weather was a secondary consideration with the enthusiastic gathering of republican voters. From every point of view the meeting was a grand success. The music was good, the speaking was on the issues of the day and not bursts of hot air.

Twelve pioneers who assisted in making the early laws of the state occupied seats of honor on the platform. These men were all instrumental in organizing the Taft-Sherman Republican Club in this city, as well as assisting in building up the party.

The Taft-Sherman quartette sang several campaign songs and considering the short time for practice, did exceedingly well. The quartette is composed of Will Muller, Fred Colvig and B. Gregory, of Medford and Dr. R. T. Burnett, of this city.

Gus Newbury held the attention of the audience for about one hour. Although Mr. Newbury has been heard on several occasions in the past he has the ability, intermingled with an occasional joke, to keep the attention of the audience until he has uttered his last word.

District Attorney Mulkey, in his able oratorical manner, reviewed the republican party from its infancy until the present day. Mr. Mulkey has been in Grants Pass attending the circuit court and returned home to assist the local club on the programme.

Taft's speech on the phonograph was good but could not be heard in the back part of the hall. The club was provided with two machines.

The meeting lasted about two hours and before closing the chairman had the enrolment books opened and several names were added to the club.

The Medford club has invited the voters of this district to be present this Saturday night at their hall in Medford. All who can should go over. There were only three from Medford last Wednesday night to attend the local rally, but this was due to the weather, and we appreciate their kindness in assisting on the programme.

JUDGE J. R. NEIL FAVORS ROADS

Would Have Roads Graveled for Winter Traffic—Presents Matter of Experting Books to the Commissioners.

Judge J. R. Neil is doing all in his power to repair the roads for winter traffic. He is putting in new bridges and repairing old ones, and is putting in galvanized culverts instead of the old wooden tunnels.

The Judge has been working hard to have the books expeted but the commissioners believe that the money would be better spent on the roads. It will cost the county about \$10,000 to expert the books and when this is done several changes in bookkeeping will take place.

The commissioners agreed to have the books examined early in 1909. It is not believed that any irregularities will develop and for this reason the commissioners are not anxious to spend the money which should be applied to the roads and highways for the benefit of the general public.

The board of equalization will meet Monday, October 19, to adjust the tax rolls.

NORTHWEST WILL SECURE CONVENTIONS

Residential Building Cannot Keep Pace With Newcomers.—Rev. Herbert Frank Moulton Working for Oregon.

If the conference of the Pacific Coast commercial bodies held in San Francisco the past week had resulted in nothing more than its action regarding national conventions, the meeting would have been one of the most important, viewed from the standpoint of the development of Oregon, Washington and their sister states, ever called. It was unanimously agreed by the delegates in attendance that the Coast should act as a unit in working to secure such conventions, each city endorsing the invitation of the others, with each of course to have a fair proposition.

Through a telegram received from Indianapolis, where the National Association of Funeral Directors have just closed their session, comes the news that this association has chosen Portland for its 1909 convention, the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition being one of the factors in making this decision.

Rev. Herbert Frank Moulton, of Biddeford, Maine, one of the best known lecturers in the country, is featuring his lecture on the Pacific Northwest, and the Oregon Development League, in connection with the commercial bodies of Washington, has furnished illustrating slides of extraordinary attractiveness.

Active publicity work has resulted in such an influx of people in the more active communities of the Pacific Northwest that housing the newcomers has really become a serious problem in some of the towns. New residences are being erected as rapidly as possible, and are long in advance of their completion. In some of the fruit districts, cars loaded with household goods are occupying the tracks and the delay in their unloading is making the orchardists apprehensive as to trackage for their fruit shipments.

The roses for which the North Pacific Coast is so famous are blooming with almost the freedom and perfection of early summer, and the approach of autumn has added to their coloring. The Portland Commercial Club has resumed the decoration of its tables with flowers furnished by different members, the display being subject of much comment by Eastern visitors in particular.
