TRIALS OF AN EDITOR

This is the time of the year when the newspaper man must suffer. The winters wood must be in the shed (and paid for,) rents are due each month, employes must be paid Saturday nights and stock and material must be paid for. To offset this advertising should be increased but on the contrary advertising decreases and the printer must wait until the holiday advertising starts in.

A great many people are of the opinion that what money they put in an advertisement is that much money donated to charity. This is not the case. Your local paper reaches every family in your city and is your silent salesman. Your paper goes where you cannot go, it talks to your customers for you. If you have an article that has remained on your shelves for a year, advertise it and get rid of it, someone wants it, and this article is taking up valuable space, to say nothing of the interest and taxes you are paying.

Look over your stock and sort out the goods that are slow to move, put them on a counter and tell your customers through the columns of the local paper that you have these goods and they must go. Reduce the price on them if necessary. You would make more money this way than to carry them over from year to year. The stores in the large cities carry on sales weekly and find this system very profitable. It creates new customers for their store; it induces people to come from other cities.

If you are in doubt about this try an advertisement for one month and you will come back the next month.

KEEP MONEY AT HOME

The way to build up any town is to patronize your townspeople. Our merchants carry a good supply of everything, and if they do not have just what they want and nothing else will satisfy you they will get you just what you want. The habits of the American people is to buy something away from home, no matter what the cost may be nor the grade of the article, as long as it was bought away from home.

The writer asked a party a few weeks since where he got a certain article, the party replied that he got it at Jacksonville, and the price was \$4.50. Do you know that this same grade of goods he had here in this city for \$4.00? It was bought at a sale. He paid 50 cents for the sale and 50 cents carefare. In other words he gave \$1.00 for the privilege of spending his money away from home.
