### CIRCUIT COURT IS IN SESSION

Judge Hanna opened the adjourned term of the September term of the circuit court in this city Monday.

The first matter before the court was passing sentence on H. M. Coss. The attorneys for the defense moved for a new trial, and the arguments of the attorneys took up the entire morning. At 12 o'clock noon the judge announced that sentence would be passed at 1:30 p. m. Shortly after the judge opened court at 1:30 p. m., and the defendant given the privilege of making a statement the judge sentenced the defendant to seven years in the penitentiary.

The attorneys for the defense moved for a stay of execution until the matter could be brought before the supreme court. This was denied and the prisoner was placed in the custody of the sheriff.

Mrs. Coss and Helen Coss was in the court room, and after all efforts on the part of the attorneys failed to release Coss from the prison cell Mrs. Coss broke down.

The evidence in the case was very strong against Coss, and all of the efforts of his two able attorneys was not sufficient to convince the jury that he did not commit the crime.

The judge, after carefully reviewing his rulings, could not see where he had erred, consequently a new trial was denied.

County Clerk Coleman issued commitment papers Tuesday and Sheriff Jones started for Salem with the prisoner. At the request of Coss the Sheriff drove over to Central Point and left on No. 16.

The supreme court denied the appeal of probable cause but granted a stay of execution. The order from the supreme court was transmitted to the sheriff by telephone Tuesday, but the seal of the supreme court was the only thing that could release the prisoner.

Sheriff Jones was met in Salem with his prisoner by Attorney C. L. Reames with the sealed order from the supreme court with instructions to return

the prisoner to the Jackson county jail.

When Mr. Reames learned that the sheriff started to the penitentiary with his prisoner he immediately called on the governor who issued orders to the warden of the penitentiary not to admit Coss.

The case will be heard Friday, October 30 in Salem. Coss was found guilty by twelve honest men at a great expense to the county and now the supreme court steps in to find some flaw in the papers.

In the matter of the state of Oregon vs. Chas. Obenchain, the following jurors were drawn: John M. Mast, David Force, E. C. Shuman, J. G. Hodges, Fred Luy, W. W. Scott, T. Cameron, Joe Goldsby, Sam Coffman, M. H. Rountree, L. L. Love and John E. Roberts. The jurors were selected Monday evening and the attorneys reviewed their side to the jury that evening and Tuesday morning the case was started. B. F. Mulkey represents the state and A. E. Reames the defense.

The jury returned a verdict of not guilty. Court adjourned until 10 o'clock a. m. Friday.
