OUR CHARTER

The charter of this city is in need of repairs. It is defective in many respects. Under the present charter it is impossible for the city to make needed improvements. There is but two copies of this important document in the city and should they be lost where would we be?

All incorporated cities have the privilege of changing their charters to suit their own ideas without taking the matter before the state legislature by notifying the people of the proposed amendments and submitting the same to a vote of the people at a special or regular election.

There are some things that must be done in a hurry, or not at all. Catching a flea is one of the best examples apropos to this. But as a rule, it is safe to say, the man or woman who works deliberately accomplishes the most. The deliberate worker is the thoughtful worker, with whom the habit or system has become second nature. The mean maximum, mean minimum and monthly mean temperatures for July and August are slightly less than for the same months in 1907, which makes that summer the hottest on record.

The equalization board completed its labors last Saturday, and the assessment roll for 1908 shows the county with \$26,685,294, when equalized totals \$26,669,946.
