BARNUM FAILS TO OBEY RAILROAD COMMISSION

The attention of the Railroad Commission has been called to the fact of the violation of the commission's order of October, 7, 1907, with reference to waiting rooms, toilet facilities, etc., by the Rogue River Valley Railway Company, and the matter has been referred to District Attorney B. F. Mulkey by the commission for such action as he may deem proper. Each violation of the order is deemed a separate offense, and there is a heavy penalty attached. This road is supposed to be owned by Barnum, the man who attacked Mayor Reddy of Medford, last spring, when Commissioner Oswald went to Medford to investigate a complaint against the road.—Evening Telegram.
