

PIONEER PASSES OVER DIVIDE

William Bybee Passed Away Wednesday Aged 78 Years—Was Sheriff For Two Terms in this County.

William Bybee, one of the best known pioneers in this part of the state and since 1854 a resident of this city, died at the family home one mile north of Jacksonville, Wednesday, November 11.

The deceased was born in Winchester, Clark county, Kentucky, April 20, 1830, and came to Oregon in 1852 and to Jackson county in 1824 when he took up a land claim on which he resided until his death. In 1864 he married Miss Elizabeth Walker, who died in 1899. To this union eleven children were born, five of whom are now living. Mrs. Chas. Prim, of this city; Mrs. Fred Luy, of Medford; Wm. Bybee Jr., of Alaska; Frank Bybee of this city and Robt. Bybee of Idaho.

In 1878 the deceased was elected sheriff of this county and served two terms. He was engaged in many skirmishes with the Indians and proved himself a very able officer. He at one time owned more than half of Jackson county, and up until the time of his death was a heavy land owner. Mr. Bybee has been an active member of the I. O. O. F. lodge since 1860.
