KIDNAPPED GIRL RETURNED HOME

Cleo Hurst, a 17-year-old girl, of Medford was kidnapped last Friday night about 9 o'clock while she was returning home from visiting friends. Two men approached the girl and threw a blanket over her head and gagged her with a handkerchief. It is thought that this handkerchief was saturated with chloroform because she immediately lost consciousness.

The girl's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Will Jackson of this city were immediately notified when they arrived in Medford a search was made and the police were notified. The neighboring towns were searched but to no avail.

Shortly after midnight Sunday night Mrs. Jackson was awakened by a noise on the steps. After investigating she found the girl lying on the steps unconscious. After being brought into the house a physician was called when the girl shortly regained consciousness.

The girl was bruised about the face and arms, which might have been done when thrown upon the steps.

The kidnapers returned their victim in a rubber tired carriage which was used to make the approach to the house as quietly as possible.

The point in question is for what purpose the girl was taken. She was not mistreated, notwithstanding this might have been the motive.

NUVEEN & CO. DEMAND BONDS

The city of Medford is on the verge of a law suit over their water bonds. John Nuvéen & Co., of Chicago contracted for the water bonds for their face value at 5% interest and 5% commission for handling them. This gave the bonding house a commission of \$18,000, and now they want interest from July 1, 1908 on money not received by the city. The interest demanded by the bonding house amounts to \$7,500.

Attorney A. E. Reames of this city has been engaged by the city of Medford to attend to the legal part of the affairs.
