**A MATTER OF
RECORD IN 1865**

In re-indexing the files and transferring them from the old wood cases to the modern steel receptacles in the county clerks office Mr. Sexton uncovered a unique legal document.

The document was a case in the circuit court, the title of which was "Action to Recover Personal Property," J. N. T. Miller vs. W. G. T. Vault. This action grew out of the "Table Rock Sentinel," owned by T. Vault and sold to J. N. T. Miller, who was at that time publishing the "Oregon Reporter."

Four issues of the "Oregon Reporter" are on file in the clerk's office as evidence in the case, the dates on these papers are: March 15, 1865; March 25, 1865; April 8, 1865; and May 13, 1865. The manuscript covers were leather, with the index written with ink on the outer side of the cover and securely sewed to the book with heavy twine string.

The "Oregon Reporter" was a weekly paper, and the issue of March 15 was Vol. 1, No. 11, being eleven weeks old. The type was badly worn and the columns were 14 "m" wide, or slightly wider than the columns of the Post. This paper was democratic politically, and contained many articles about the war. One of the articles, "The View of Jeff Davis on Peace" will appear in the next issue of the POST. This article is interesting inasmuch as it was written during war times.

The editorials in those days were chiefly "roasts" for someone who did not believe as the editor believed. The news portion of the paper gives a very good sketch of history of Jacksonville. We could not find any figures on the population of the city but would judge that Jacksonville was a city, at that time with about 4000 population.
