Years ago when the O & C. was put through this valley the people were jubilant, they could get mail and freight from both Portland and San Francisco in a few days for one-tenth what they had been paying.

They could get their produce to market in better shape which means a better price. Now these same men are complaining about the rail road. They say that the rail road has stole all the good land. Dear reader when the O & C R R was put through from Portland to San Francisco it cost an enormous sum of money. It was twenty years before this road paid expenses, and the company was aware of this fact, and in order to induce some company to invest all and operate the road the government was obliged to give a bonus, which at that time was very small.

This bonus was every odd section of unoccupied land within 25 miles of the accepted survey. This land, at that time would not bring 25 cents an acre, with a possible few exceptions. To this rail road is due the credit for the present prosperous condition of this valley. Without it our fertile valley would be worth naught.

The Southern Pacific road bed is assessed at \$30,000 a mile in this county, which assists in developing the country they pay taxes on this unoccupied rail road land.

OREGON FIR MAKES FRIENDS

John Sebastian, Passenger Traffic Manager of the Rock Island System, was a recent visitor at Portland, and while here secured samples of Oregon fir, with which wood he intends to finish the interior of one of the most unique dining cars yet seen. He had scarcely left when a telegram was received by the Portland Commercial Club from President B. L. Winchell of the Rock Island, asking for samples finished in different stains, as a car already nearly completed was to be in fir. Sir William C. Van Horne, builder of the Canadian Pacific Railway, has in his Montreal mansion a room in Oregon fir, which is always admired by visitors.

The business men of Portland will go to Spokane on Friday, December 11th, to attend the National Apple Fair, and this will be the first trip of its kind over the "North Bank" road. Pullmans, diners and parlor-observation cars will make up the train. The visitors will have all day in Spokane and return so that the scenic portion of the trip will be made by daylight, arriving home at 5:30 Sunday afternoon.

The Oregon-Idaho Development Congress, of which Hon. Stephen A. Lowell, of Pendleton, is president, will meet at Vale, Oregon, from December 17th to 19th. The program will be interesting and delegates are expected from all sections of the two states. Coos Bay has promised an especially large representation.

White Salmon, Washington, the apple center of the "North Bank" road, holds the record for liberality in raising an advertising fund. The entire population of the village and valley of White Salmon does not exceed 600 people, and at a recent meeting they raised \$2200 or almost \$4 apiece.

From the exhibits in connection with the meeting of the Northwest Fruit Growers' Association and the Oregon State Horticultural Society a most effective and unusual advertisement of the fruits of the Pacific Northwest has been evolved. The twenty choicest boxes of prize-winning apples have been purchased by the Portland Commercial Club, and after display in the windows of Macy's famous store in New York City for a week, ten boxes will be sent to King Edward of England and another ten to Kaiser Wilhelm of Germany.

A conference of the officers of the State Dairy Association at Salem has determined the details of that Convention December 10th and 11th. The sessions will be held in Ye Liberty Theatre, while a commodious hall has been secured for exhibits. The Board of Trade of that city will receive exhibits and care for them so that they will be in excellent condition for display. Messrs. Wm. M. Ladd, Dr. E. N. Hutchinson and Dr. James Withycombe are among those on the program.

It is only a ride of a few minutes from the snow-clad mountains of Ashland until one reaches the sunshine and warmth of Jacksonville.

There are several brick buildings and several blocks of cement sidewalks under course of construction, and when this has been accomplished the southern metropolis will be a city of some importance.

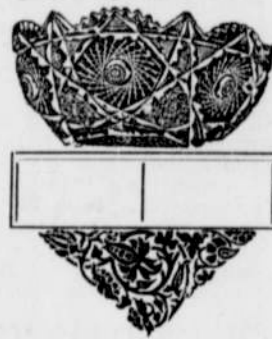
