OUR NEXT SENATOR

The next Oregon assembly will have a very important matter to consider—the election of a United States senator. The election of Governor Chamberlain to the U. S. senate this winter would mean that Oregon would have one member. Geer received the vote of the people and was defeated in the legislature.

The November election was evidence that the state is strongly republican and if the June election was fair the electors were misinformed. The November election gave Taft 62,539 and Bryan 38,049.
