Synopsis of Compulsory Education Law

Applies to Whom—All children between and including the ages of nine and fifteen years, and all children between the ages of fifteen and sixteen years not regularly engaged in some useful employment, must attend school each year as long as school is taught in the district in which the parent or guardian lives.

Exceptions—Children taught the common school branches at home or in a private school or by a private tutor, such instructions to be equivalent to that given in the public schools.

Children that can prove by an examination that they have mastered the common school branches, such examination to be given by the County Eighth Grade Examining Board.

Children who are physically unable to attend school, a physician's certificate being accepted as competent evidence.

Children between the ages of nine and ten years who live more than one and one-half miles from school, and older children who live more than three miles from school by the nearest traveled road.

Traut Officers—One or more appointed by the District Boundary Board for districts of the second and third class; compensation shall not exceed \$2.00 per day for time employed, to be paid out of the general fund of the county.

Traut Officers for districts of the first class appointed by the school board and paid from the fund of the district.

Plan of Enforcement—School clerk required to furnish teacher or principal with a copy of the school census, together with the names and addresses of parents and guardians.

Teacher or principal required to compare such census with enrollment once each month and report to the Secretary of the District Boundary Board the names of all children not in regular attendance at school. Eight unexcused half-days absence during any four weeks constitutes irregular attendance.

Secretary of District Boundary Board required to notify Traut Officer. Traut Officer shall within twenty-four hours, serve written notice in person or by registered mail, upon parent or guardian, directing him or her to send child or children to school on the following Monday, and that the attendance of such child or children must be continuous during the remainder of the school year.

At the same time the Traut Officer notifies the teacher or principal that he has served such notice upon the parent or guardian.

If parent or guardian fails to comply, the traunt officer is required within three days to file a complaint before a justice of the peace, who shall issue warrant and proceed to hear the case in the same manner as other offenders are tried.

Penalty—Parent or guardian, if convicted, liable to fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$25.00, or imprisonment in county or city jail not less than two nor more than ten days, or both fine and imprisonment.

It is the duty of school officers, teachers, principals, and superintendents to assist in the enforcement of this law, neglect of duty on their part punishable by a fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$20.00.

BURGULAR COUGHT WITH THE GOODS

The harness shop of South & Jewell, at Grants Pass was broken into last Saturday night and some tools and some stock was taken. The burglary was not discovered until Monday morning when August Bowdin, who had been employed in the shop, was missing. Sheriff Russel of Josephine county telegraphed the description of the man to different towns in the valley. Chief of Police Shearer of Medford got a description of the man and made the arrest.

Bowdin had sold some of the goods to a Medford harness man claiming that he received the goods in part payment for his services. He had a small bundle of goods with him when arrested.

O. A. C. IS A MODERN SCHOOL

The Oregon Agricultural College, at Corvallis, is one of the most advanced schools of its kind on the coast, and this fact is appreciated by those who have taken advantage of a course in either of the many branches.

The college has arranged to give short winter courses, for the benefit of those who cannot spare the time to take a full course. The following is a summary of the branches taught:

Farmers' week, January 5 to 9; Creamery practice, January 5 to 15; dairying, January 18 to March 27; horticulture, January 11 to February 20; mechanic art, January 11, to February 20; household science and art, January 11 to February 20. There is no admission fee and the only requirement is that you are over 16 years old and of good moral character. The expenses for the farmer's week is very light, from \$3.50 to \$4.50. The other courses will require a registration fee of \$1.00 and in addition to a \$2.00 fee will be charged in the ten weeks' course in dairying as a laboratory fee and a breakage deposit of \$3.00. Those in mechanic arts will pay a fee of \$2.00 for blacksmithing and \$2.00 for wood-work.

The dairying course teaches cheese making as well as butter and separation. Horticulture is a very important study inasmuch as this course includes lectures by men of experience in their particular line, also the disease of fruit and vegetables.

The school is well equipped having everything necessary to carry on practical work. Aside from the fine laboratory and library the school is equipped with blooded stock and poultry and a large farm for experimental purposes.

Music and military training and chemistry are prominent features of the school.

OREGON RECEIVES COMPLIMENT

(Special Correspondence.)

One of the most important gatherings to be held on the Pacific Coast during 1909 will be the convention in Portland of the Association of American Agricultural Colleges and Experiment Stations, brought here through the instrumentality of President W. J. Kerr, of the Oregon Agricultural College. The American Association of University Presidents, the American Association of Farmers' Institute Workers, the Agronomic Society, and the Association of Agricultural Chemists always hold their conventions at the same place and time as the Association of Agricultural Colleges and Experiment Stations, and will therefore be here also. Delegates to these meetings comprise college and university presidents, directors of experiment stations, experts in the different bureaus of the Department of Agriculture, and other specialists, and an attendance of between 1200 and 1500 is expected. An extended visit to the A-Y-P Exposition is included in their schedule. The exact date of the convention will be announced soon.

J. E. Defebaugh, editor of the "American Lumberman" of Chicago, who has bestowed such marked praise on Douglas fir, has the following to say editorially in the current issue of the "Lumberman":

The Pacific Northwest makes a wonderful appeal to every visitor. It is a land of living waters, of golden soil, of mineral wealth beyond comprehension, of forests which will bless mankind when other lands are desolate; a land of mountain, plain and valley; of a people great in intellect, energy, endurance and kindness. In this golden Northwest, in a climate without the harshness of the North or the enervating softness of the South, these people are building an empire. They have harnessed the streams for power or, pouring them over the plains, have produced fruitful fields and gardens; they are wresting from the earth its mineral wealth; they are converting the forests into forms of utility and beauty; they are building schools and colleges; the Bible vision of every man dwelling under his own vine and fig tree is realized here, where his every bodily need and intellectual want may be gratified. The natural wealth of the country is great and great are its achievements, but better than all this are the people themselves a chosen race growing in numbers and in all the accomplishments and graces which make a people mutually useful and happy.

The convention of the Oregon State Dairy Association at Salem last week was the most successful ever held by that body. Washington and California were represented in both attendance and exhibits. The grand prize for best display of dairy products was awarded to F. A. Schubinger of Salem for an exhibit comprising 26 varieties of cheese. The Douglas Creamery Co. of Roseburg won first award for highest scoring creamery butter, F. G. Matke of Sweet Home, for highest scoring dairy butter, and T. J. Ballantyne of Hobsonville, for highest scoring cheese. The dairymen pledged a fund of \$150 per month for the employment of an expert to bring dairy conditions throughout the state up to the highest possible standard. An appropriation of \$6000 will be asked from the legislature. President F. L. Kent of Corvallis was re-elected, with Carl Abrams, of Salem, Secretary. The time of next year's meeting will be chosen to harmonize with the date selected by the Washington Dairymen, who meet at Chehalis this week. Hon. C. L. Mitchel, of the Dairy Division, U. S. Department of Agriculture, is in Chehalis for this meeting.

Posters are out announcing the annual excursion to San Francisco which will leave Ashland on December 26. Those who have not visited the "Windy City" since the fire will have an opportunity to see the new San Francisco at a small cost.
