We need the next dairy convention as well as the horticultural convention and if we get together and work we can get them.

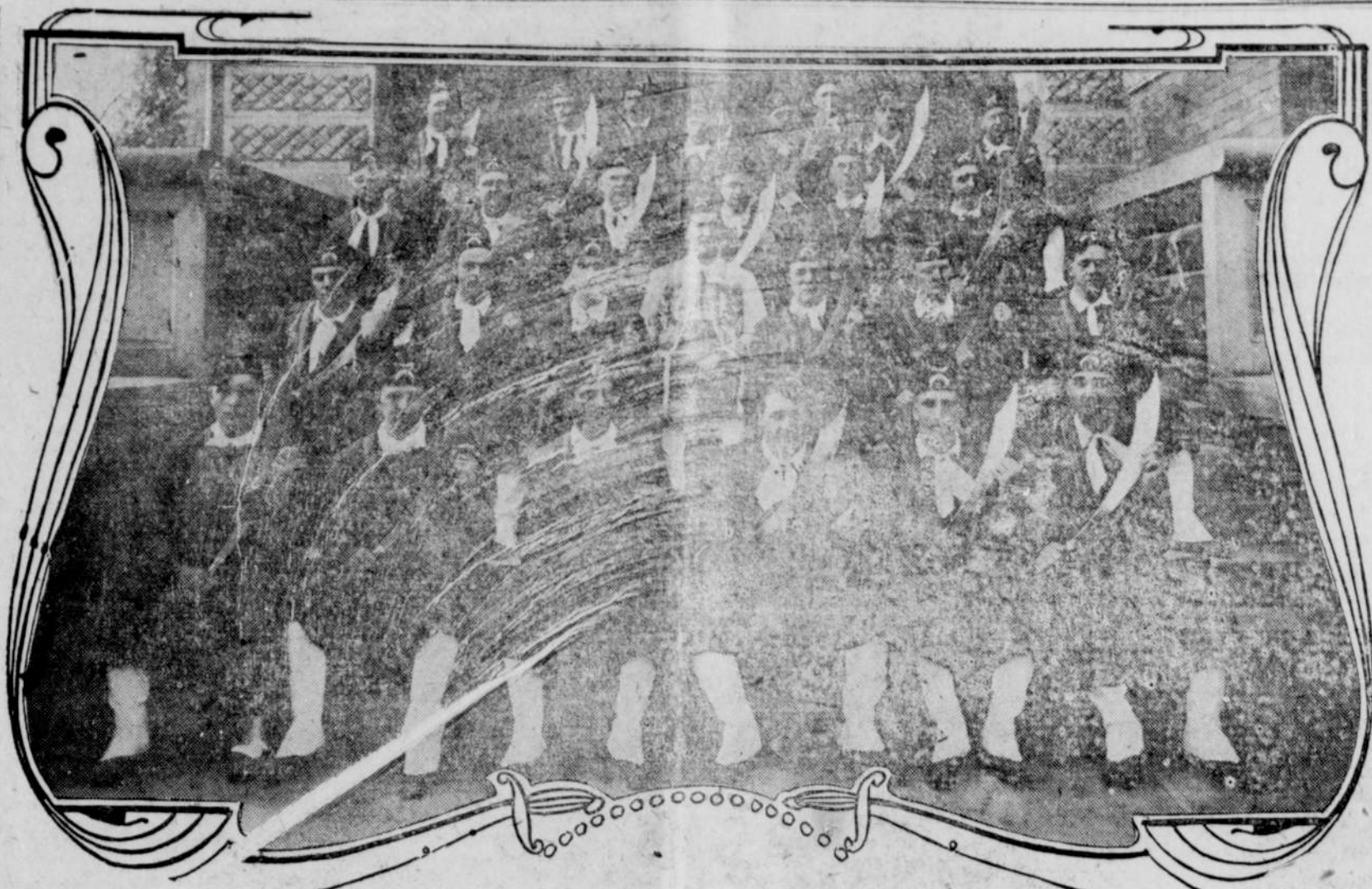
By bringing these conventions to the city we will be laying the foundation for our enterprises.

Synopsis of Compulsory Education Law

Applies to Whom—All children between and including the ages of nine and fifteen years, and all children between the ages of fifteen and sixteen years not regularly engaged in some useful employment, must attend school each year as long as school is kept in the district in which the parent or guardian lives.

Exceptions—Children taught the common school branches at home or in a private school or by a private tutor, such instructions to be equivalent to that given in the public schools.

Children that can prove by an examination that they have mastered the common school branches, such examination to be given by the County Eighth Grade Examining Board.

Children who are physically unable to attend school, a physician's certificate being accepted as competent evidence.

Children between the ages of nine and ten years who live more than one and one-half miles from school, and older children who live more than three miles from school by the nearest traveled road.

Trauant Officers—One or more appointed by the District Boundary Board for districts of the second and third class; compensation shall not exceed \$2.00 per day for time employed, to be paid out of the general fund of the county.

Trauant Officers for districts of the first class appointed by the school board and paid from the fund of the district.

Plan of Enforcement—School clerk required to furnish teacher or principal with a copy of the school census, together with the names and addresses of parents and guardians.

Teacher or principal required to compare such census with enrollment once each month and report to the Secretary of the District Boundary Board the names of all children not in regular attendance at school. Eight unexcused half-days absence during any four weeks constitutes irregular attendance.

Secretary of District Boundary Board required to notify Trauant Officer. Trauant Officers shall within twenty-four hours, serve written notice in person or by registered mail, up on parent or guardian, directing him or her to send child or children to school on the following Monday, and that the attendance of such child or children must be continuous during the remainder of the school year. At the same time the Trauant Officer notifies the teacher or principal that he has served such notice upon the parent or guardian.

If parent or guardian fails to comply, the trauant officer is required within three days to file a complaint before a justice of the peace, who shall issue warrant and proceed to hear the case in the same manner as other offenders are tried.

Penalty—Parent or guardian, if convicted, liable to fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$25.00, or imprisonment in county or city jail not less than two nor more than ten days, or both fine and imprisonment.

It is the duty of school officers, teachers, principals, and superintendents to assist in the enforcement of this law, neglect of duty on their part punishable by a fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$20.00.

which affords abundance of moisture. Wells of a depth of 18 feet cannot be pumped dry with an ordinary family pump. The water is pure and healthful, which accounts, to a large extent for a low death rate.

OPPORTUNITIES

The opportunity for the investor is as good today, if not better, than it was 20 years ago. To those who are looking for fruit land I wish to say that no state in the Union can produce more fruit to the acre than can be grown in Southern Oregon, and the rich flavor so far in advance of the Eastern grown fruits that our products command from three to five cents a pound more in the open market than fruit grown elsewhere. The soil and climate is due to the size and delicious flavor of Rogue river valley fruit. The melting snow on the mountains sub-irrigates the entire valley during the growing season, and when the fruit has passed to the stage of ripening nothing except the clear rays of the sun hangs over the fruit. One grower in Jacksonville received \$7.50 a box for apples last year, another cleared above expenses \$625 an acre on pears. However, this was an exceptional year, and cannot be considered an average. The average net profits on an acre of apples, pears or peaches is about \$500, although some men claim as \$1000.

GRAPES

It is truthfully claimed that the finest grapes in the world are grown in the Rogue river valley. The Flame Tokay, the peer of all table grapes, is grown in large quantities along the foot-hills surrounding Jacksonville, and is claimed by commission men to be the best selling grape on the market. The enormous size and delicate flavor win for it friends wherever exhibited. Large tracts are being planted to grapes this year, the tokay taking the lead in acreage. The average net profits per acre range from \$250 to \$350. There yet remains thousands of acres of good grape land in the vicinity of Jacksonville awaiting the industrious hand of the homeseeker.

MANUFACTURING

Our forests contain large quantities of fir, oak, cedar, hemlock, ash, maple and pine. Our timber is sawed into lumber and shipped East to be manufactured into furniture only to be returned to the coast with the freight added. We need furniture and molding factories and sash and door works, and many other factories where our timber can be manufactured into useful articles, thus saving the unnecessary freight on surplus wood. The mountain streams afford an abundance of water power for operating mills of all kinds.

CENTRAL POINT KEEPING PACE
