CARRYING CONCEALED WEAPONS

Judge Van Sante of Portland is imposing the maximum fine on all those who are brought before him on a charge of carrying concealed weapons. He hopes by so doing that the evil caused by carrying revolvers will be eliminated.

This will have little or no effect on the situation. The Post believes that a law should be enacted at the next session of the legislature prohibiting the sale of all small firearms unless by permission in writing from the judge of the circuit court in whose district the fire arm is to be bought. Further, that all fire arms sold must be reported to the circuit judge in the district in which the sale was made; thus preventing a forgery.

A heavy fine has never done anything more than take bread from the needy, the rich never pays a fine for spending much time behind the bars, although his acts may justify a life sentence. The Thaw case may be referred to where millions—yes \$40,000,000—was spent in the defence of the case. Can you buy justice with \$1,000? I do not wish to go on record as saying that Thaw paid the judge \$1,000,000 to send him to the asylum. But I do remember reading the following: "Mrs. Thaw has opened her purse of \$40,000,000 in defense of her son." If Thaw was not guilty, or if he was insane why would it require \$40,000,000 to set him free?

Stevens of Portland whom committed bigamy, is free today. Cost who was convicted by twelve honest men for rape and sentenced to serve seven years in the penitentiary was granted his freedom by the supreme court until such time as they may be able to review the case. Murderers and highwaymen are operating almost daily within the borders of this state and without the revolver it is safe to predict that three-fourths of the crimes will be eliminated. The law on the books is worthless unless it is placed in execution. Which would be the more beneficial? Eliminate the revolver or the criminal. The criminal may reform, will the revolver.
