EXAMINERS IN CONFERENCE

Following the instructions of Comptroller of the Currency Murray the national bank examiners of District 11, comprising Montana, Idaho, Oregon, Washington and California met Tuesday in Medford for their first gathering of its kind. The regulation which provides for such meetings is a new departure of the department and Medford was chosen as the first meeting place.

The chairman of the meeting is E. T. Wilson of Montana, who arrived from the north on No. 15, accompanied by F. H. Luce of Washington, and Claude Gatech of Salem, C. L. Loveland of Idaho, J. A. H. Kerr and C. J. Reed of California arriving on No. 14 from the south.

The first session will be called at 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon and will continue throughout the evening. It is probable that the convention will have completed its business before train time Wednesday so that the examiners may depart.

The people of Astoria should, one and all, thank Mr. Evans for what he has done for them. He built them a railroad, one of the finest in the state. He brought \$50,000,000 to the city and only asked a paltry few thousand dollars from the citizens who will receive every cent of it back with good interest.

With modern electric cars running upon our streets, connecting several smaller towns of the valley Jacksonville would grow more rapidly than any city in the valley. Should Cap. Evans return to this city next spring and offer one half the proposition he offered last summer we should jump at it. He has made good in Astoria and can make good here. A town cannot grow and prosper without rail facilities and the more railroads and the better the equipment the more rapid and solid the town will grow. Think it over and boost for an electric line, boost hard and we will get it assist the proposition financially, and you will get every cent of it back in cash with interest besides developing the country and the town.

If every citizen in the city would put up \$2.50 each we would have an electric railroad here within four months. See what they have done in Astoria. The same man who caused that line to be built offered the citizens of this town the same proposition and they rejected it. The \$2,500 of stock sold brought \$50,000,000 to the city.
