

COUNTY COURT'S BUSY SESSION

Large Grist of Work Before the Commissioners--333 Bills Allowed and Three Disallowed--New Road District Made.

The January term of the Commissioner's court is generally long but this term was longer than usual. The following was the business transacted by the board:

Order approving plot of Anderson-Toft addition to Medford.

A plot of Central Sub-division was filed and approved.

Order that sheriff issue tax certificate covering lots 28 and 29 in block "1" in Ashland to F. M. Calkins.

H. T. Pankey, constable of Gold Hill district filed his bond of \$1000 and same was approved.

In the matter of the correction of tax receipts of C. R. Beardsley and wife it was ordered that lots 1 and 6 and the east half of lots 2 and 5 in block 30 in Ashland as described in Vol. 48 page 118 to Edna M. Morris, belong to Chas. R. Beardsley and Alinda Beardsley.

The Bond of M. F. Eggleston for \$1000 as justice of the peace of Ashland precinct was approved.

Road district No. 10--Beginning at 1/4 sec cor on n boundary of sec 6, tp 38 s, 2 w, thence e 2 miles to the 1/4 sec cor on n boundary of sec 4, same tp, thence e 3 1/2 miles to tp line at se cor sec 24 same tp, thence s on tp line to state line, thence w to sw cor of Jackson county, thence n w boundary of Jackson county, to nw cor of tp 40 s, 4 w, thence 4 miles to se cor sec 34, tp s, 4 w thence n 4 miles to the cor on s boundary sec 31, tp 38 s, r 2 w thence n 6 miles.

The Jackson County Abstract Co. received \$5,500 in part payment for the present ownership maps.

There were 333 bills allowed and three rejected. The disallowed bills are: Dr. T. T. Shaw services for indigent soldier \$58, Peter Applegate for having 1907 tax roll copied, \$149, McNair Bros. drugs for indigent \$1.15.

Katie M. Grieve was appointed deputy assessor.

In the matter of the petition of A. D. Gordon for change of road it was ordered that Frank Grisey, David Pence and J. S. Tucker be appointed viewers.

TAX LEVY

The tax levy for 1909 follows: State 1.5 mills; school 1.7 mills; road, 1.4 mills; for general county purposes including officer's salaries 1.8 mills; making a total of 6.4 mills. To this County Judge J. R. Neil issued the following protest:

"The undersigned hereby enters his protest against the action of the county commissioners in making a tax levy of six and four tenths mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation of the property in Jackson county for the year of 1909, because such levy is unnecessary and is more or less oppressive on the tax payer. A tax levy of five mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation of said property for the year 1909 will produce one hundred and thirty-three thousand dollars, enough to meet the current expenses of Jackson county for the ensuing year. J. R. Neil, county judge."

It will appear by the above protest that the judge is not in favor of a road tax. The assessed valuation of the county is \$4,000,000 higher than it was last year and with a 6.4 mill tax the county will raise \$25,600 on the increased valuation. The tax rate last year was about 7 mills.

BUY HOME PRODUCTS

How a California City Set the Pace For All Towns.

BOOSTING LOCAL ENTERPRISE

Campaign of Purchasing and Praising Goods Made at Home Proves a Wonderful Success--Idea Applicable Here or Anywhere.

In November I had the privilege of spending a week in a city which has developed beyond most other places in the United States the spirit of loyalty to home industries. Every town in this country, large or little, may profit by the example of the city mentioned, which is none other than Los Angeles, Cal.

"Buy and boost home products" now is the slogan of that city. Perhaps never before has such an impetus been given to the home trade movement and such a jolt handed out to the mail order octopus as resulted from the proceedings of the one week I mention. It was called "prosperity week." As a student of local development anywhere and everywhere the writer watched people and witnessed performances in that city during prosperity week with perhaps more than the average interest. It is because he believes that every town--this, that and the other town--may profit by the example of Los Angeles that he writes briefly here of the doings in that city.

In the first place, it may be said that prosperity week was the idea of a bright young business woman, Miss Frances Holmes.

Miss Holmes proposed that for one week every citizen should make a special effort to patronize home industries, buy goods made at home, give the mail order catalogue the go-by for the time being and discover what was to be discovered. Everybody co-operated--that is, everybody but the mail order folks, who looked askance. But their opposition was not a drop in the ocean. The city chamber of commerce got to work, adopted the slogan "Buy and boost home products," had it wrought into a design, copyrighted the design, printed it by the thousands and distributed it to merchants, manufacturers and individuals. "Buy and boost home products," you may well believe, was as popular for the week as the latest catchy song from the comic play at the opera house.

Everybody bought and boosted. And it was surprising to observe how many home products there were to buy and boost. Every local manufacturer, from automobiles to corkscrews, saw that his products received proper displays. Every one who made anything for the market made the fact known to his neighbors, many of whom never had suspected that such an enterprise was "in their midst." For instance, they had been putting various kinds of pickles in their midst for many years bought outside, but they discovered local pickle factories with just as many varieties and just as good pickles. The same fact held as to crackers, breakfast foods, steam engines, oil cans, post cards, and right here let me relate an amusing thing.

A Los Angeles hotel had spent much money, more time and its entire stock of patience in trying to get some picture cards made in Germany, where it was supposed all the picture cards came from. Germany is a long shot from California, and it takes more time and money to get post cards made there than the average citizen might suppose. This hotel man during prosperity week discovered that he could get his cards made just as beautifully colored right at home at a price considerably lower and much more satisfactory as to time.

There was during the week a big "buy and boost" parade. It was four miles long. Everything in line was homemade, produced right there. The people rubbed their eyes in amazement. They were just waking up from a long sleep. They had discovered that their neighbors were manufacturing a great many of the things required in every household and by every person. They bought and boosted.

The local merchants each made elaborate window displays of home products. Here and there and everywhere were the copyrighted "buy and boost" cards. At the end of the week scores of merchants declared that their sales had been augmented to an extent they could not have predicted without being called visionary. They said that it had been made evident that people really prefer to buy home products if they know such goods are to be had, and they are confident that hereafter the sales of such articles will be much larger than in the past.

The manufacturers, big and little, are jubilant. The city is swelled up, to use a phrase that is expressive if not elegant. Pride in home products, home enterprise, home development, has received such an inflation that the swelling up is as plainly to be seen as the expansion of a balloon when the gas is pumped into the limp silken bag. But there is no hot air or gaseous expansion in this local pride. It is a permanent proposition to be reckoned with in dollars and cents for the town wherein it happens to be on tap.

There is an excellent and salutary hint in all this for any town in America that wants to improve and advance in prosperity. Why don't you resolve from this time forward to buy and boost your own home products? Try it as a systematic procedure and find out just how much you can help your town and your neighbors and incidentally yourself. It is worth while.
