TOWN PHILOSOPHER'S TALK.

He Expatiates on Feed For Towns That Tend to Anemia.

"So long as people continue to hold the theory that distance lends enchantment to a bargain, just as it does to a view," remarked the town philosopher, "just so long will the local merchants suffer for lack of trade and the town remain stunted because it is not fed sufficiently to insure its proper growth. The food of a community is cash. That's a solid food, but highly necessary to make a community strong and vigorous. Dollars are easily digested. The community appetite is always normal, and if you keep on shipping your dollars out by money order or bank check to distant points to buy things you could buy right here at home with equal advantage or better this town will stay hungry and increase in gauntness.

"I know towns," the philosopher continued, "that are so lean because of this underfeeding, due to mail order competition, that their boxes stick out and are visible to the naked eye. If you want to starve your home place and stunt its growth so that when it comes to a mature age it will be as puny and stinky as a youth who has smoked seven packages of cigarettes every day since he was fourteen, just continue to feed the town's legitimate food—the dollars produced here—to the voracious maw of the mail order concerns away off yonder. But if you want your town to be healthy and happy and look fat and prosperous, with good red blood in its veins, patronize the home merchant, the home manufacturer, the home tailor, doctor, dentist, printer, etc., every time you have a dollar to spend. Feed your dollars to your neighbors and they will reciprocate in kind."

Need of Harmonious Action.

Recently we said some things about the squabbles between business men of certain towns, of the discord and the lack of harmony that prove so detrimental to all interests of the place and assist along the mail order houses and the box car men. Never was there greater need of harmonious action on the part of the merchants of the land, says the Agricultural Southwest. Never as now should merchants of every class discover how closely intertwined are their interests with all the business interests of the community where they reside. The Price Current would see associations so perfected that at meetings all farmers, laborers and every class of workers could be present and just see what is going on and leave with resolutions to pull hand in hand with the tradesmen for the building up of the town. Surely every one in a community should feel that any project that is for the building up of the place is a thing that he is individually interested in. This is the sentiment that means harmony and co-operation and not backbiting, throat cutting competition and ill feeling, that are so detrimental to a town.

Advertising is today the mightiest factor in the business world as well as a great home trade boomer. It is an evolution of modern industrial competition. It is a business builder, with a potency that gives beyond human desire. It is more than a "drummer" knocking at the door of the customer; something more than mere salesmanship on paper.

It is the strong pull and the long pull altogether, as the sailors say, that makes the town a good one. Where there is no harmony or concerted action on part of the citizens success cannot be hoped for.
