You must have other essentials, and the chief of these is to be able to get near the buyer and to inspire that confidence which will induce long-continued mutual good feeling, and to this end the newspaper is yours.

From a careful canvass it appears that a large majority of the people in this section of the state are in favor of the Crater Lake road. 'Tis true that \$500,000 will be spent on the road if it is put through. This money is to come largely from the taxpayers of the county through which the road passes. It will cost \$25000 annually to keep the road in repair, also must come from the taxpayers, a large part of whom will never use the highway. The road will not be used in the winter time, because no one would care to visit the lake at that season of the year. If this sum of money was spent on the roads of the county it would benefit the county more than would the Crater road. It would enable the farmer to reach the market in the winter when he could get a better price for his produce, it would cause the county to settle more rapidly and above all a prosperous farmer is worth more than two Crater roads.

Don't laugh at a boy who magnifies his place. You may see him coming from the postoffice with a big bundle of his employer's letters, which he displays with as much pride as though they were his own. He feels important, and looks it, but he is proud of his place. He is attending to business. He likes to have the world know that he is at work for a busy concern. Let his employer do the right thing by him; check him kindly if he shows signs of being too big for his place, counsel him as to his habits and associates, and occasionally show him a pleasant prospect of advancement. STAMPED ENVELOPES

The government has been sending out circulars asking the public to buy stamped envelopes. Is this discriminating against the taxpayer? We will see. The No. 5 size, according to

the government figures, is the regular business size. This envelope is sold for \$21.24 per thousand or \$10.62 for 500. The stamps on these envelopes are worth \$20.00 and Uncle Sam makes a charge of \$1.24 for the envelopes. If I buy 100,000 of these envelopes today from the factory I could get them at that figure. The government further agrees to print a return card on them FREE OF CHARGE. Another expense to be paid by who? The government delivers the envelopes to your nearest postoffice FREE.

Listen! Somebody must pay for these envelopes dear reader, and someone must be benefitted by the sale of them at this figure. The government goes on a pathetic way and says: "Everyone who uses government stamped envelopes is aiding the Post Office Department in improving the service." We may add that it is improving the service for Harrimans and Morgans and other large corporations who use large quantities of envelopes but the poor farmer who will use only a few envelopes a year cannot have his envelopes printed but he must pay the difference in the cost of production and the selling price for the large corporations.

WILL BURY JACKSONVILLE

"A promoter for the interest of Jackson county" takes an exception to an article printed in the Post of last week. He says: "Enclosed we beg to hand a clipping which will serve to illustrate how very easy it was for a town under many difficulties to win over the detrimental forces and awake to an illumined future."

The clipping referred to is fiction written by Holman Day and published in the "Saturday Evening Post." The story was well written and is of the "Bill Nye" order. He continues thus:

"Under the conditions stated in your issue of the Post under date of February sixth, one must assume that only a short period can elapse when Medford must assume her right to possession of the county seat and of course after such proceeding it would be advisory to cut you off the map. "We trust you have ample room in your burial grounds for the balance and in any event beg to assure you of our heartiest co-operation with that end in view. Very sincerely yours, I beg to remain "A Promoter for the advancement of Jackson County."

As to Medford's right to possession to the county seat we must say that it would require a vote of the taxpayers of the county to change the county seat. It is very doubtful whether Medford precinct would approve of the change when they consider the fact that it would cost about \$100,000 to make the change. This sum would have to be raised by the city of Medford and considering the fact that Medford is nearly \$500,000 in debt at the present time it would not be wise to put \$100,000 more on the shoulders of the taxpayers.

Medford is paying 17½ mills taxes now, and on an investment of \$4000 the taxpayer is obliged to pay in taxes \$70.00 annually. Add to this \$100,000 for a court house and another \$100,000 to build a dyke along Bear Creek and it is quite likely that the court house

will remain where it is.

Promoters are frequently a detriment to a community and generally promote to their own pocket book when the community will permit of their presence. Can you say that in your business of "promoting" that you did not attempt to graft from the citizens? If not you are an exception and have deviated from the rules of the profession.

The article was penned by the editor of this paper and was intended to show the voters that we need municipal improvements, and cast no reflections on Medford or any other city, but on the contrary praised Medford for her paved streets and air of progressiveness and it is very doubtful whether a representative citizen from Medford had anything to do with this letter.
