SOUTHERN OREGON HOSPITAL BURNS

ASHLAND, Or., March 9.—Fire, which started from a defective flue in the attic of the Southern Oregon Hospital here this morning, enveloped the entire upper portion of the frame structure, which was badly gutted before the flames were gotten under control. Eight patients, bedfast were carried out safely on litters, and all occupants and attendants at the hospital escaped without injury. The damage to the building and furnishings will perhaps reach \$4000, with little insurance.

SUPREME COURT SUSTAINS PUTNAM

SALEM, Or., March 9.—Holding that the defendant had the right to introduce evidence tending to prove the truth of his assertions, which formed the basis of his conviction of criminal libel in the trial court, the Supreme Court in an opinion by Justice Bean, reversed the decree of the Circuit Court in the case of the state vs. George Putnam.

Putnam is the editor of the Medford Tribune, and was convicted of criminal libel for having published a criticism of the grand jury for having failed to return an indictment against Superintendent Barnum, of the Rogue River Valley Railroad, upon the charge of having assaulted former Mayor Reddy of Medford, with an ax in the former's office.

CHAMPION JACK WRITES TO JEFF

NEW YORK, March 10.—James J. Jeffries today received a typewritten challenge purporting to come from Champion Heavyweight Jack Johnson.

The former champion perused the paper and then after putting it into his pocket laughed and declined to comment.

The challenge was presented to Jeffries by Frank Wheaton, a negro attorney, who claimed he represented Johnson.

Jeffries had just emerged from the courtroom of Magistrate Harris of the west side police court. Judge Harris previously had decided that Jeffries' exhibition with Berger did not constitute a violation of the state law relative to sparring.

SPECIAL SESSION FOR MARCH 15

Governor Benson has issued a call for the legislature to meet on next Monday. The session is called to rectify a few errors made in the appropriation bill for the improvements of the asylum.

A new normal school bill may be presented at this session. Following is the call issued by the governor:

State of Oregon, Executive Department.

I, F. W. Benson, by virtue of the authority in me vested as governor of the State of Oregon, do hereby direct the two houses of the legislative assembly of the State of Oregon to convene in special session in the state capitol, in Salem, on Monday, the 15th day of March, A. D., 1909, at 10 o'clock a. m. of said day for the purpose of enacting senate bill No. 254, introduced at the twenty-fifth regular session of the legislative assembly of 1909, and upon which bill final action was inadvertently not taken being an act, entitled "An act to appropriate money for the expense of the improvements, equipments, betterments, supplies, repairs and other necessary expenses at the Oregon state insane asylum, state penitentiary, state reform school, Oregon institution for the blind, state institution for feeble minded and the Oregon soldiers' home."

All members of the house and senate of the state of Oregon, who at the date hereinbefore mentioned are entitled to act as members of said legislative assembly, are hereby required to attend such special session.

Given under my hand and the great seal of the state of Oregon, at the state of Oregon, at the capitol in Salem, this 5th day of March, A. D. 1909.
