The Pacific Outlook and the Medford Mail each had a nice article last week boosting for the electric road through the valley. The Post takes this opportunity, in behalf of the citizens of Jacksonville, of thanking these two papers for the kindness displayed in assisting to bring the matter prominently before the people.

I would suggest that you get a piece of land and get busy before you find fault in the men whom you should respect. You may be old some day and when that day comes be sure that you did this or that for the benefit of Jacksonville.
