LAW MAKERS

DRAW SALARY

The outcome of the special session was very unsatisfactory to the people of this district. The legislature assembled last Monday and corrected a few errors made by the regular session, but the greatest error was voted down.

The house tried to do something for the schools but the senate refused to do anything. The senate passed a bill appropriating \$8000 for Weston, Monmouth and Ashland to defray the expenses from January 1 to June 31, and transferring the property to the school districts in which the three schools are located. Every friend of the normals voted against this bill and the friends of the normals defeated it in the senate.

The session cost the taxpayers \$7,500 and this was due to the poor business methods followed by our "able" law makers. They drew their salary (?)

What could be expected from this body? A few schools in the senate shamber may prove to be more beneficial to the state, especially during a session of the legislature.

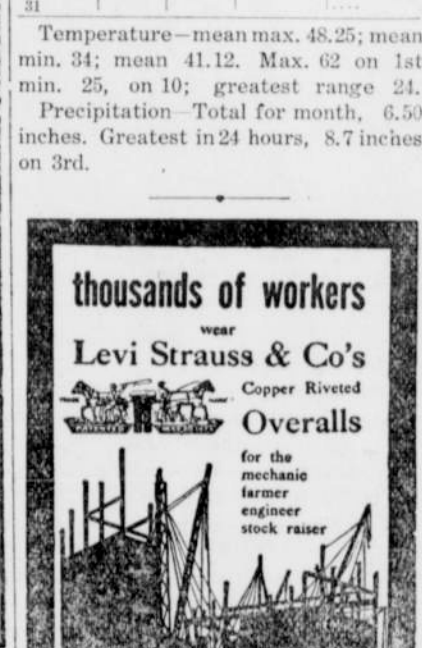
