ERROR CORRECTED

It has been rumored that the Jacksonville Post has changed hands, nevertheless it is in the same old building with the same old editor laboring for the good of the people.
 Mr. D. W. Bagshaw, of Oakville, Washington, is associated with the Post and will direct the editorial quill. Mr. Bagshaw is an able writer, and comes well recommended from the northern state, while the former editor is a printer. There is the same difference between a printer and a writer that exists between a carpenter and a mill hand, and we should all welcome an improvement.

RENEWED ACTIVITY

With the opening of spring the citizens of Jacksonville are preparing to push the old town to the front in a manner never before witnessed in this city.

The streets are being put in good condition and the leaves and stones are being removed. The matter of paving the main streets is being considered and it may be well here to give a few figures on the cost.

It will cost a little less than \$1200 a block to put down hard surface pavement, or about \$145.00 for 50-foot front. This could be paid for by the city and assessed to the abutting property to be returned to the city in ten annual payments of \$14.50 each. Thus we can have paved streets and no one would feel the strain. By paving California street from the Lyden hotel to the street leading to the court house and one block on either side we would have twelve hard surfaced streets at a cost of about \$145.00 to the 50-foot front. It would mean that about \$16,000 would put in circulation.

The increased valuation of property would easily pay the expense. Business would stop in our city that is now going elsewhere. The repairs on the present streets for ten years would amount to about one-third the total cost of pavement. In other words, the cost per each 50-foot front would amount to about \$100.

Could a more beautiful picture be drawn of a city? The beautiful maple trees bordering each side of the streets whose majestic bows interlock, causing a shade as cooling and refreshing in mid-summer as the gentle breezes of early spring, hovering a street as hard and smooth as a mansion floor. Under such conditions the historic village would forge ahead of any city in the valley.
