**TRAINS BLOCKED BY SNOWDRIFTS**

**April Storm Plays Havoc With Railroads in Colorado.—Frigid Weather Hurts Missouri Fruit Crop.**

CHILLICOTHE, Mo., April 13.—A heavy snow fell in this part of Missouri today. The temperature dropped to below the freezing point. Fears are entertained that the large apple and peach orchards in this section will be damaged.

DENVER, April 13.—Blocked in the midst of April by snowdrifts that are too deep and too long even for big rotary plows successfully to buck, the east bound passenger train on the Denver Northwestern and Pacific Railroad, known as the Moffatt road, is tied up at Earl, on the west side of the Continental Divide. The train with its 75 passengers was blocked yesterday at Corona; on the summit of the divide where a howling blizzard bid fair for a time to keep them tied up for several days, but the train finally managed to get back to Earl, where provisions are plentiful. Two big rotaries have failed to make an impression on the big drift, which is 20 feet in depth and today big gangs of laborers are attacking it with shovels. Officials of the road say traffic will be open before night.
