FOR THE GOOD OF OREGON

Boosiers Get Together For Post-Graduate Course--Will Hold Conference--One Hundred Thousand Compliments For Oregon.

(Special Correspondence.)
Community advertising has reached a climax in Oregon, and an advertising Conference under the auspices of the Oregon Development League will be held at Eugene on Tuesday, May 4th, with the Eugene Commercial Club in charge. The Secretary, Manager and President of every commercial organization in the state are expected to be present on this occasion to participate in a discussion which cannot be other than beneficial to all concerned.
All the visitors will meet at the Eugene Commercial Club Tuesday morning, May 4th, at 9:30, when a local committee will take them for a ride over the city to show what has been accomplished in the way of paving streets, new parks and buildings, with a brief stop at the State University. A business conference will convene promptly at 1:30 in the afternoon at the Commercial Club rooms, and the entire afternoon will be devoted to a discussion of work actually accomplished by the different organizations.
No state in the Union has carried forward an advertising campaign superior to that now being handled by the Commercial bodies of Oregon. Every organization and every officer has different ideas and this conference is called in the hope that all may be benefited, and that each one present will be able not only to give but to receive information, advice and instruction, which will be of service to the individual communities, and for that reason of great help to the state at large.
A theatre has been engaged for the evening where Oregon views will be shown with a stereopticon.
As the direct result of a meeting in Cottage Grove under the auspices of the Oregon Development League, that active community has already raised an advertising fund of \$3,900, and this will reach \$4,200.00. Most of the places which talk about their per capita contribution will have to take off their hats to Cottage Grove; that city has determined to put itself on the map in a really effective way.
The Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul Railway, in a magnificent booklet of which it has just issued 100,000 copies, says in its introduction of Oregon: "A land of fertile hills and valleys, mountains of untouched forests, a climate unequalled anywhere, the scenery of which the eye never tires and the mind never ceases to wonder, Oregon attracts the homeseker and the tourist. Its 99,000 square miles furnish every need of human calling. Thousands are findings homes and fortunes in the midst of its inexhaustible resources, etc., etc."
