

HOW HAWAII FARMER USES VOLCANO

Story of Most Novel Swine Ranch In World And How An American is Making Easy Money.

Feeding hogs on Giant ferns which have been previously cooked by the heat from a volcano, is a novelty in the agricultural field which it is safe to say can be seen in but one place in the whole world. That place is in Hawaii; and one man at least is making a profitable business out of his foresight and enterprise.

Peter Lee, an American, has a ranch right on the edge of the great crater of Kilauea, on the island of Hawaii, some 200 miles from Honolulu. All about the tremendous cauldron of nature spreads dense forests for many miles down the easy slope of the mountain's sides. Very much of this tangle of vegetation is made up of great tree ferns, many of which tower fifty feet or more in the air, like great feather dusters. The great trunk or stem of this fern, frequently a foot or more in diameter, is composed of a pulpy, fibrous mass enclosed in a hairy harder covering. Peter Lee discovered that this pulp contains a large amount of starches and sugars, and that by steaming or cooking, these are rendered soft, and are greedily eaten by the hogs.

It was some time before the present method of cooking the ferns suggested itself, but when it did the problem of economy was solved. In many places about the volcano, sometimes several miles from the active central pit, cracks have formed in the hardened lava surface which covers the whole mountain, doubtless through the contraction of the material in cooling, and from these fissures heat and steam in various degrees of intensity perpetually escape. To construct a gridiron over one of these heat cracks, and to pile upon it the fern trunks, cut into cord-wood lengths, was the acme of simplicity, but for effectiveness could scarcely be improved upon. In the course of a few days, dependent on the amount of heat of any particular crack, the steam has thoroughly softened and cooked the ferns, and all that remains to do is to split each stem with an ax, when the swine will devour them voraciously.

Dr. E. V. Wilcox, director of the Hawaii Experiment Station, believes that Hawaii's ferns may come to be of considerable economic importance as a stock food. Fern roots have had some value in this line in some parts of the Northwest, where the growth is comparatively scanty, and if the food value of Hawaiian ferns prove as high, large tracts of forest land are likely to acquire a new value.

SPECIAL RATES TO WALLA WALLA

One and one third fares on certificate plan will be granted all attending the Conservation Meet, by the Northern Pacific, O. R. & N., Great Northern, and S. P. & S. railroads.

Roseburg Robbers Caught

OAKLAND, Or., April 25.—An exciting capture of two robbers by Sheriff Fenton, of Douglas County, happened here yesterday afternoon on the Hart Ranch. The men were wanted for robbing several Roseburg clothing dealers last Thursday night, when they secured \$150 worth of valuable clothes and silks.

Sheriff Fenton had been hot on the trail of the men ever since the robbery was discovered, and had been driving over the mountain roads night and day in his efforts to take them into custody. Yesterday morning the two were located on the road between here and Roseburg, but eluded their pursuers by getting into the hills, where they were again found in the afternoon, and they gave their pursuers a fast run across the fields, and it was necessary for the officers to empty their guns at the fugitives before they were finally captured and taken to Roseburg by the Sheriff.

They had with them all of the stolen goods. Tracey claims to be a puglist. He is about 23 years of age, while Johnson, who says his home is in Seattle, is about five years his junior.—Portland Telegram.

Heavy Colonist Travel

For the first six weeks of the Spring colonist season an increase of 50 per cent has been maintained. Figures for the first two weeks of April bring the total for 1909 up to 9470 homeseekers who have come to the Oregon country via the Harriman lines, as against 6379 for the same period last year.

The record since March 1, this year, is only a few hundred under the entire aggregate for the whole season of 1908 when the total was 10,041.

The gain for the two weeks in April, just reported today, over the same fortnight, a year ago was 1140, the totals for the two weeks in April being 2067 for 1909 and 1927 for 1908.

With three weeks more to be heard from it is now absolutely certain that all former records for the movement of colonists to this territory will be broken this year.—Telegram.
