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STORMS SWEEP SOUTH

Hundreds Injured and Large Property Loss. Reports Indicate That From 150 to 200 Were Killed.

Reports from the east giving account of the storm which swept the states of Illinois, Tennessee, Alabama, Arkansas, Georgia, Mississippi and Missouri state that the death list will approximate 200 persons in the states named while the injured will probably number eight or nine hundred.

The casualties in Tennessee alone are reported to be 65 killed and 79 injured with several points yet to hear from. Horn Lake, Miss., reports 40 dead and 100 injured, many seriously. It is impossible to give an accurate estimate of the monetary loss at the present time but it is believed it will run into the millions.

This storm is described as the most destructive one ever known in the region affected and is also remarkable for the extent of territory covered, reaching from the great lakes on the north where it took the form of a mild blizzard, to the Gulf of Mexico where it assumed the power and fury of a tornado.

NEW COMPANY ELECT OFFICERS

The L. N. Subdivision No. 1 Telephone company was organized on Tuesday afternoon and officers were elected. The company will add about 15 of the residents on the west side of the valley to the lines of the Pacific States Telephone company. The line follows the county road from Jacksonville towards Central Point to the Bell line connecting with the Jacksonville exchange.

The use of vegetable material for matting is finding greater and greater favor, especially in tropical countries; but recently, among the inhabitants of colder climates. Vegetable matting is very sanitary, of more cleanly appearance, and more readily cleaned than woolen floor coverings.

Recent experiments at the Hawaii Experiment Station have shown that the Japanese rush and the Chinese matting sedge may be successfully grown here; that the yield of these plants is high, running up to four or five tons of dried material per acre annually; and that there is a sale for such material at prices ranging from forty to eighty dollars per ton. The Japanese rush does not need splitting, but the Chinese matting sedge must be split before weaving. We need a machine specially devised for this work. Furthermore, there would seem to be an opening, when such a machine is in operation, for the manufacture of matting here in the Islands from home-grown material. At present the only factory in sight is in Maine, and the freight to that factory would be much greater than from the Gulf Coast and other sources of supply for the new material.

Mayor of Tacoma Indicted

The grand jury of Pierce county returned an indictment Saturday against John W. Linek of Tacoma for failure to enforce certain ordinances of the city in regard to renting buildings for immoral purposes. It was charged that the Mayor openly allowed the places to run and ordered the police department not to interfere. The Mayor has given bonds in the sum of \$2000.

Then there are internal difficulties; grafting, civic corruption; diseases a thousand years old still festering. It is doubtful if the Young Turks really intend or desire to reform these ancient abuses. They surely cannot do so unless they are wiser and truer reformers than they have shown themselves to be so far.

Meanwhile Edward of England, a potent figure if he chooses to move, remains stationary, mum, and this will rebound to his credit in the ultimate report of the advancement of civilization. There was never a greater opportunity for a great head of a state to strike a blow for mankind than Edward of England has now.—Oregon Journal.

A Novel Lock

According to a daily press report a safe lock has been invented which is provided with phonographic mechanism so that it can be opened only by the voice of the owner. A mouthpiece like that of a telephone takes the place

of a knob on the door, and this is provided with the usual style or needle which travels in a groove in the sound record of the phonograph cylinder. Before the safe can be unlocked the password must be spoken into the cylinder by the one who made the original record. The report does not state what would occur if the owner should come down to his office with a bad cold.—Ex.
