Reports say that the country is flooded with bogus \$20. and \$100. bills, these reports don't scare the editors to any great extent.

The Oregon State Grange was wise in declaring for better roads, good roads are one of the strongest factors in the settlement and upbuilding of any country and money expended for roads will return large dividends to the entire state.

The new insurance law which goes into effect today, providing that a surety bond of \$25,000, may be substituted for the \$50,000, now deposited by the insurance companies will likely throw a large number of government and municipal bonds on the market.

It has been said "that all things come to those who wait," but that saying is obsolete in these days of bustling activity, to get anything of worth now requires persistent, well-directed effort.

In regard to the location of a railroad the writer has been informed that "we need not worry, the road is bound to come here anyway," but be not too sure of it; other towns are putting forth their claims and offering inducements while many here seem indifferent and unaware of the opportunities presented.

This town has many advantages not possessed by other towns in the valley and every resident should second the efforts of the Commercial Club and City Council in making these facts known, forgetting every petty difference and uniting together for the best interests and advancement of our town and country.

Will End all War.

In an article recently published, William T. Stead writes of the aeroplane in his usually characteristic way as follows:

"It simply means the end of war," he says, "and armament will go as armor went, while 12 inch guns will be as obsolete as the bow and arrow. The aeroplane is the next step. Like Lytton's potent compound of electricity and dynamite, by which a child could destroy an army by waving a wand, the aeroplane places illimitable forces of destruction at the command of anybody who can raise \$50,000 and find a half a dozen desperadoes to do his bidding.

As Captain Talloch says in a notable article in the Nineteenth Century, the chief city of the Thames valley could be brought to ruin by a single airship planting a dozen incendiary missiles in certain spots during a high wind. Only a few minutes would be necessary to have the whole riverside, with ships wharves, warehouses and also the arsenal in an unconquerable blaze.

"The human race is absolutely unprotected from above. What then is it demanded? The governments should federate into one great world-state with international parliament without whose command no war could take place on the earth, in the air or in the air or on the sea."—Journal

Thirty passengers were injured in a railroad wreck on the Chicago & Alton railroad, near Odessa, Mo. Sunday.

The U. S. senate has confirmed the nomination of General George B. Davis as judge advocate general.

Centralia, Wash. has organized a company to erect and operate a canning factory at that place.

The Michigan legislature has passed a new liquor law limiting the number of saloons to one for each 500 population and fixing the open hours for saloons from 6 A.M. to 9 P.M.

The postoffice at Bremerton, Wash. was entered by burglars Thursday night. They drilled the safe and took away \$9000. in stamps and \$200. cash.

The missing Archduke Johann of Austria, has been located on a ranch in British Columbia.

The government of Brazil has appropriated \$100,000. to fight the spreading of tuberculosis in that country.

A mail car on the Great Northern, was held up and robbed of \$20,000 near Spokane, Wash. early Sunday morning.

The Secretary of the Interior has ordered the restoration to entry of 15,360 acres of land heretofore withdrawn for irrigation purposes in the Umatilla district, but not utilized.

Captain Peter Hains, slayer of Wm. A. Amis has been sentenced to a term of from eight to sixteen years, at hard labor.

Engineer Wm. Dale was scalded to death in a head on collision on the N. P. near Ellensburg, Monday Morning.
