#### THE NEW CHARTER

As was expected, the charter amendments were approved by the people Thursday by an overwhelming majority. The total vote cast was 104, of which 102 were for the amendments and 2 against them. The total vote was somewhat smaller than the usual number cast at general city elections but the proportion in favor of the amendments was greater than had been expected by friends of the measures. The returns convey a distinct compliment to the members of the town board and the City Attorney, showing that the voters had full confidence in the measures proposed and that what they done had been wisely and well done.

#### BETTER TELEPHONE SERVICE

A representative of the telephone company has been in town this week, trying to arrange for an all night service, also arranging for the installation of a new and up to date switch board. Some difficulty was encountered in obtaining a new room for the exchange, the company not wishing to install a costly equipment in the frame building now occupied, wishes to secure a room in a brick building where the fire risk will not be so great.

While the lines at night will not be kept so busy as in the day time, there will be many instances in which the night service will be found very useful. We hope the council and citizens generally will give the company all the aid and encouragement possible in their effort to install better service.

#### COWS AT GOLD HILL

The council of our neighboring city, Gold Hill, is considerably excited over the cow question according to the News. "The question now is whether it is expedient to compel the owners of cows to keep them from annoying other people, or whether they should be allowed to still run at large and make a farce out of the term city as applied to Gold Hill, and the town itself a joke with all progressive communities." Shut them up by all means, neighbor, a cow running at large is no joke to the man who owns a vegetable garden.

It is a specialist's work and is one line of the food production industry that will never be over-done and the profits in it will always be big and sure.—Fruit Grower.

Secretary Ballinger having approved the location maps of the rights of way through the Dechutes Canyon it would seem that there should be no further obstacle in the way of building the Harriman road into Central Oregon. It is stated that condemnation suits covering almost all the right of way needed have already been instituted and that preparations are being made to begin work at an early date. The movements of the company in regard to the building of the road are being watched with interest by the people of the entire state. Meaning as it does, so much toward developing vast areas of unimproved land and affording transportation for the products of land already occupied it is almost impossible to over-estimate the benefits which will accrue from the completion of this project.

W. D. Boyce, publisher of the Chicago Saturday Blade, is planning an expedition into Africa which will eclipse the one headed by Mr. Roosevelt, if carried out as planned. Mr. Boyce proposes to take telephoto cameras, the latest inventions in photography, and by the use of captive balloons, high in the air will take pictures of the inhabitants of the jungle, as well as of the different lakes, rivers and mountains which will later be used to illustrate different publications. The expedition will start about Sept. 1st.
