Disclosures in the Sigel murder mystery reveal facts which are simply horrible and show plainly to every thinking person the futility of attempting to "christianize" such races as the Chinese by women missionaries. The teaching of centuries, coupled with all the traditions of the race, has instilled into the mind, until it has become part of the Chinaman's character, the belief that woman is an inferior. If obedient and pleasing to her husband and master she is to be petted and made much of, but if displeasing she is to be removed that another may occupy her place. Knowing the estimate at which women are held by the Chinese, we are at a loss to understand why women of education and refinement should undertake the task of attempting the conversion of these people while so many opportunities offer for missionary work among members of the white race. One result of the tragedy should be to require the removal of young women teachers from the mission schools, by the civil authorities if necessary.

Christian ladies, of the white race, young or old have no call to enter Chinese missions as teachers or otherwise. The fallacy of attempting the conversion of the Chinaman has been repeatedly proven and needs no further demonstration. Some Chinamen have professed conversion to the Christian religion but careful inquiry reveals the fact that in ninety-nine cases out of the hundred it was a matter of policy, not of conviction. If teachers for Chinese schools are needed—let men be employed to give the necessary instruction, the lady teacher can if she seeks it, find plenty of scope for her "missionary talent", among those of her own race.

Memphis, Tennessee, enjoys the distinction of being the largest city in the world where the sale of intoxicating liquor is prohibited by law, 600 saloons in that city were closed by the new state law which went into effect at midnight June 30th.

JUSTICE AND THE LAW.

It is undeniable that Messrs. Gompers and Mitchell have been guilty of violation of an order of the courts and insofar of contempt of court. If Mr. Gompers and his comrades serve the excessive sentence imposed upon them, millions of right-thinking men throughout the land will be deeply troubled concerning the punishment of these men for

violation of an order of the courts and on the other hand concerning the fact that there are men in the land who are law-breakers, who have for many years been deliberate, persistent, debauching law-violators and yet have gone unwhipped of justice. The law technically is justified in punishing Mr. Gompers and his comrades, but the real lawlessness of injustice comes to light in the immunity which is assured to the glorified lawbreakers by the dexterity and maladroitness of the legal power which they command.—Stephen S.
