#### THE COURT HOUSE

The Medford Tribune in its issue of Tuesday works off a long winded spiel about the removal of the county seat to Medford, giving as its principal reason for the change, the statement that "the retention of the county seat at Jacksonville has been an unnecessary burden and inconvenience, since the advent of the railroad not only to the people of this county but also to those of the First judicial district, comprising Jackson and Josephine counties, forcing waste of time and money in reaching court." The article states further that "the present courthouse has been long since outgrown and its antiquated facilities are a disgrace," etc., and declares that a new building must soon be erected, threatens a submission of the question to a vote of the people, says that the days of old have long since passed away, etc., etc.

The writer of the article in question must have been indulging in a pipe dream, or possibly he had an acute fit of indignation and used this method of working off the surplus gas.

The Fourth of July, 1909 is a matter of the past, although some of the results still remain. Jackson County's people as a whole celebrated at Medford where a general good time was had without the accidents usual to many celebrations of like character. The showers during the afternoon dampened the ardor of some of the enthusiastic participants but had no perceptible effect upon the younger generation and were of great value in lessening the danger of fire from the explosion of firecrackers, etc. As the smoke and noise of the celebration fades from our sight and hearing, let us remember the acts and principles for which we annually celebrate, "An inalienable right to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness", a sentiment the influence of which is now felt over the whole civilized world.

The citizens of Jacksonville need feel no uneasiness over the agitation of the removal of the county seat question. Before the matter can be submitted to a vote of the people, a petition signed by at least three-fifths of the number of voters at the last election must be filed with the County clerk. We doubt very much whether one-half of the required number of signatures can be obtained. The tax payers of Jackson county are not likely to ask that an indebtedness of two or three hundred

thousand dollars be placed on their property, simply to gratify the ambition of a few real estate agents and promoters.
