

**INITIAL CLERK-CARRIER EXAMINATION**

The United States Civil Service Commission has been advised by the Post Office department of the proposed establishment of city delivery service at Medford, Oregon on September 15, 1909 with two carriers and one substitute. In view of this fact, the initial clerk-carrier examination for Medford, Oregon will be held in this city on July 24, 1909.

Age limit 18 to 45 years. Selections will be made from the register resulting from this examination to fill the carrier and substitute positions. Selections will also be made from this register to fill any vacancies that may occur in the position of clerk.

Applicants should at once apply to the Postmaster, Postoffice, Medford Oregon, for an application form and instructions to Applicants. Applications must be filed with the Secretary, Twelfth Civil Service District, Room 211 Postoffice Building, San Francisco Calif., prior to the hour of closing business on July 21, 1909. The examination will be held in the Medford High School Building.

**General News.**

The Wright Bros' aeroplane was disabled while making a trip at Fort Myer, Friday.

A bolt of lightning killed a negro mourner at a funeral in Dublin, Ga. last week.

Nampa, Idaho, had a \$250,000. fire Saturday.

Centralia, Washington will save \$25,000. annually in lower insurance rates, as the result of establishing an up-to-date fire department. The average reduction from the old rate will be about 33 per cent.

The body of George Welden, with the top of the head literally blown off, was found near Kalama, Wash. Friday. A 30-30 gun was found beside the body.

The McCormick Lumber company's plant near Pe Ell, Wash. was entirely destroyed by fire early Monday morning. The mill was one of the largest and best equipped mills in that section. Loss, \$200,000.

The "daylight saloon" law enacted by the last legislature, went into effect in Nebraska, Tuesday. The measure forbids the selling of any liquor between 8 P.M. and 7 A.M.

The mill and plant of the National Wood Pipe Co. at Olympia, Wash. the largest factory of its kind on the coast was entirely destroyed by fire, Saturday evening. The plant employed about 125 men. Loss is estimated at \$225,000., insurance \$40,000.

Gen. George B. Crosby one of the most distinguished of the surviving officers of the Confederate army during the civil war, committed suicide at his home in Oakland, Calif. Friday. He was aged 79 years.

Mrs. Pecumber proprietress of a boarding house at Newidria, Calif. and her five children were burned to death in an incendiary fire Saturday night.

Ten thousand steel workers, employed in mills at Pittsburg, Pa. are on a strike against "open shop" order.

The much talked of West Main street bank is now an assured enterprise. This will give Medford four banks. The site selected is at the northwest corner of West Main and Grape streets and the building is now being put up. The promoters of the bank are G. L. Davis of Jacksonville and L. E. Wakeman of this city.—Medford Mail.

**ORDINANCE NO. 124.**

AN ORDINANCE granting to the PACIFIC TELEPHONE AND TELEGRAPH COMPANY, its successors and assigns, the right to place, erect and maintain poles, wires and other appliances and conductors, and to lay underground wires for the transmission of electricity for telephone and telegraph purposes in and upon and under the streets, alleys, avenues, and thoroughfares and public highways in the TOWN OF JACKSONVILLE, STATE OF OREGON, and to exercise the privileges of operating telephone and telegraph instruments within the said TOWN OF JACKSONVILLE.

**THE TOWN OF JACKSONVILLE DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:—**

**SECTION 1:** THE TOWN OF JACKSONVILLE hereby grants to the PACIFIC TELEPHONE & TELEGRAPH COMPANY, its successors and assigns, the right and privilege to place, erect, lay, maintain and operate in the streets, and alleys, avenues and thoroughfares and public highways within said city, poles, wires and other appliances and conductors for the transmission of electricity for telephone and telegraph purposes. Such wires or conductors may be strung upon poles or other fixtures above ground or may be laid under pipes or conduits or otherwise protected, and such other apparatus may be used as may be necessary or proper to operate and maintain the same. Poles on California street to be 35 feet in height with no more than two (2) cross arms, also poles within one block of California street to be 30 feet in height.

**SECTION 2:** It shall be lawful for the PACIFIC TELEPHONE & TELEGRAPH COMPANY, its successors and assigns, to make all needful excavations in any of said streets, alleys, avenues, thoroughfares and public highways in said Town for the purpose of erecting and maintaining poles or other supports for said wires, or other conductors or for repairing the same, or for the purpose of laying down, maintaining and operating said wires or other conductors underground or for repairing the same. Said work shall be done in compliance with the necessary rules, regulations, ordinances or orders, which may during the continuance of this franchise be adopted from time to time by the TOWN OF JACKSONVILLE.

**SECTION 3:** Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed in any way to prevent the proper authorities of the TOWN OF JACKSONVILLE from sewer, grading, planing, repairing or altering any of the streets herein mentioned, but all such work shall be done if possible so as not to obstruct or prevent the free use of said poles, wires, conductors, pipes or other apparatus.

**SECTION 4:** This franchise and the rights and privileges therein contained, are granted to the PACIFIC TELEPHONE AND TELEGRAPH COMPANY, its successors and assigns, upon the consideration that the TOWN OF JACKSONVILLE shall have the right and privilege to suspend and maintain wires upon the poles placed by said grantee, its successors and assigns, in the streets and thoroughfares aforesaid, or if said wires are placed underground, to use any and all wires which said Town may require for fire alarm and police telegraph service, free of charge to said Town of Jacksonville, also free use of one telephone at City Hall. The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company agree to give continuous service when Jacksonville exchange has one hundred subscribers connected.

**SECTION 5:** The rights, privileges and franchises herein granted shall continue and be in force for a period of twenty (20) years from the date of the passage of this ordinance.

**SECTION 6:** This ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage and publication.

All the "set pieces" displayed on the Fourth—fery portraits of George Washington and spirited spark pictures of the "boys of '76"—are made in America. An eastern firm once made up some "glant" firecrackers, using a tiny quantity of dynamite for the explosive.

Dynamite sends as much force downward as upward when it explodes, and whenever one of the firecrackers was exploded a little hole was bored in the ground. The young son of the president of the company which manufactured them set one off while it was lying on one of the stone slabs of the steps leading to his house. The slab was shattered, and the dynamite firecrackers were taken from the market.

The most delicate and altogether wonderful fireworks are the bombs made by the Japanese to be exploded by the daytime. These bombs are sometimes spherical in shape and sometimes cylindrical, and occasionally the two forms are combined in a cylinder with a ball at one end.

Fire d from steel mortars, the bombs exploded in midair. After the smoke has cleared away a figure of some sort goes floating off in the upper air. Two enormous dragons twist and turn, as in mortal combat, until St. George in the guise of their own fiery tongues bids them begone, and they vanish in a puff of smoke. Perhaps the Japanese goddess of mirth hilariously waves a little three-cornered flag with a square hole in it and smiles benignly down until she has settled away out of sight. The combinations produced in these day fireworks are almost endless.
