It is not the intent to carry much baggage on this train, baggage will follow.

For local points passengers should take trains 19 and 20 and 15 and 16. Going North the Portland Express only makes the larger town stops. No. 13 however makes about same stops as formerly. For additional information as to what trains stop at different points call at or phone the depot.

The coach heretofore carried on No. 225 is discontinued, local freights will pass Medford during the day instead of night as heretofore.
