

FRUIT TREE CENSUS

Authorities Will Institute Classification of Various Varieties

Preparations are being made by Professor P. J. O'Gara to take a complete fruit census in Jackson county, so that it will be possible to know how many trees of the various varieties are planted throughout the county and their condition and age. In a short time a fund of information will be available regarding the fruit industry, something that has long been needed.

Blanks have been prepared by the professor so that each inspector in the county can compile the data rapidly and well. At the top of each sheet will appear the name of the orchardist, his address, the date of the report. Under the head of pears will be found the names of the following varieties: Bartlett, Comice Winter Nellis, Anjou, Bosc and Howell. Following this will be the number of trees, their age, whether they are in good or bad or medium condition, whether they are diseased, and if so in what manner, and if the land is cultivated or not. Space is also provided for apples, the following varieties being named: Newtown, Spitzenberg, Jonathan, Winesap, Arkansas Black, Ben Davis, Winter Banana, Delicious, Rome Beauty and Baldwin. Peaches, nectarines, cherries and grapes also have their place upon the report.—Ex.

A NEW USE FOR ROGUE RIVER ASBESTOS

A market for the vast quantity of asbestos that could be mined in Rogue River Valley may be made possible as the result of the invention recently made by a man in San Jose, California. This new use for asbestos is in the manufacture of railroad ties. These ties are made of composition of asbestos and cement reinforced with wire netting. It is claimed for these ties that they are indestructible; that the cement and iron gives them strength to hold the rails and bear the tremendous weight of locomotives and cars while the asbestos gives a spring to the ties quite equal to that of wood.

The increasing demand for ties and the steadily decreasing quantity of timber is making the tie problem a serious matter with the railroad companies. Stone, iron and cement ties have been tried but were found unsuitable for they gave such a rigid roadbed that passengers complained on the jar and the locomotives and cars were strained and loosened in their joints by the unyielding track. The asbestos-cement tie would afford fully as much spring as the wood tie and it is claimed that it will hold the rail better and give greater safety to traffic than is had with wood ties.

Should the asbestos-cement tie prove a success the manufacture of railroad ties would soon become one of the big industries of Rogue River Valley. There are a large number of known deposits of asbestos and should there be a demand to stimulate prospectors there would no doubt be many more deposits discovered. Lack of a market has prevented the development of these asbestos mines. The cement could be made here in quantity as cheaply as it is manufactured in any other place in the world for there are vast ledges of lime-rock and marble and of shale and clay.

SEE STEVENS' HAND IN SALE OF P. & E. Ry.

Early announcement of the taking over of the Pacific & Eastern Railway, formerly the Medford & Crater Lake project, by interests represented by John F. Stevens, may be expected. With Mayor Reddy, of Medford, who is now receiver for the moribund road, Stevens made an inspection trip covering a considerable portion of the almost inexhaustible timber belt which the proposed road will tap. This tour covered several days, and Reddy admitted he had "spent some time with mysterious Mr. Stevens." The next step in the game was when Receiver Reddy came to Portland about a week ago and made a dicker with Receiver Deylin, of the defunct Oregon Trust & Savings Bank, whereby the latter ex-

changed \$100,000 worth of the railroad's bonds for \$31,500 worth of certificates of deposit which Reddy held against the bank. This deal, which was confirmed by the Circuit Court the last of the week, swept away all existing barriers that might stand in the way of consummating the plans of the promoters of the road as projected. It would also enable the receiver to dispose of the road at private sale or throw it on the market. The haste with which Receiver Reddy turned the deal with the bank might be construed as a strong indication that he had a buyer for the road who would take it over as soon as the title could be cleared up.—Telegram.

The sawmill of Miller and Son, near Salem, burned Saturday with 300,000 feet of lumber. Loss \$50,000.

It is announced that a railroad from Bandon to Port Orford will soon be built.

The rainfall at Portland during the month of July reached a total of 2.24 inches, the greatest amount of precipitation during the same month in the past 39 years.

The first good run of salmon in the Columbia this year started Saturday.

The Beavis-May oil drill at Dufur, is now down 1500 feet and is making good progress.

F. B. De Guire, a pioneer of Oregon and one of the oldest men in Marion county, died at the home of his son in Silverton, Thursday night, aged 91 years. He settled in Oregon in 1854 and has resided in Silverton since 1857.

P. G. Wells, postmaster at Gladstone has resigned.

The District Attorney of Wasco and Hood River counties has issued a decree declaring that the state law regulating and restraining the participation of minor children in dramatic and public entertainments, must be rigidly enforced.

County Looks Good

Alaska man buys options on Applegate farm land—Says that a fruit patch in Southern Oregon is better than a gold mine in the frozen north.

C. J. Hobart, formerly a collector of customs in Alaska, is a recent comer in Grants Pass and a guest of C. G. Coutant, with whom he was intimately acquainted while the latter was in the Alaskan field. Mr. Hobart has been looking over the adjacent territory with a view to making extensive land purchases and he states that the country looks very good to him. It is his plan to secure a large tract here to be cut up into small farms and fruit ranches for the purpose of locating a small colony of Alaskan people. Mr. Hobart and associates have taken options upon a tract of 500 acres of fine land in the Applegate valley, so located as to be most suitable for his purpose, and he will, as soon as the purchase can be closed, seek to interest a large number of people with whom he is acquainted in Alaska. He states that there are many miners in that country who are tired of the quest for gold and want to get back to a land of fruit and flowers. Although he has nothing against Alaska he admitted, in reply to our insinuation, that a fruit patch in Southern Oregon was better than the average gold prospect in the frozen north.—Outlook.
