SPECIAL TERM OF
Circuit Court Convenes
Monday.

The special term of circuit court presided over by Judge Coke who was appointed by the governor to hear the case of Medford vs Hanley, convened in the court house in this city Monday.

The first day was taken up with arguments, etc. Mr. Reames contending that the governor had no right or authority to call the special session and that certain legal requirements had not been complied with, Mr. Neff, for the City of Medford claimed that the governor had the right to call and the judge named had the right to hold the special term ordered.

On Tuesday the jurors were taken by automobile to the place where the pipe line is proposed to be laid and on their return the hearing was resumed. But two witnesses were examined and the case was given to the jury at 11 o'clock Wednesday, after being out until after 3 o'clock when they returned with a verdict stating "that the defendant, M. F. Hanley, will be damaged to the extent of \$600.

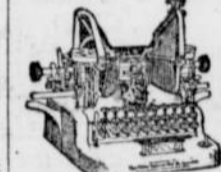
