Prosperous Farmers

A recent editorial in the Portland Journal speaking of the prosperous condition of the farmers says in part as follows:

"In the decade 1880-90 the value of farm products increased only \$250,000,000, less than 10 per cent, though there was a great increase in volume. Nor was there much increase up till 1897, but from that year to 1900 inclusive the value rose rapidly. Since 1900 the gain has continued unabated, every year showing a large advantage over the preceding year.

There is evidence in these figures not only of good prices for farm products, but of better farming, and that the pessimistic cry that the fertility of the soil was being exhausted is largely fallacious. The fertility of the virgin soil has abated, of course, but farmers

are rapidly learning to take better care of the soil, and in a great many cases it is producing more than it did years ago. After the struggling home builder got "out of the woods" they began conserving their soil resources, and are doing so now much more than ever, and will do so more and more."

"For ten years prior to 1906, the farmers, though raising good crops, could get little for them, and grew poorer. This caused a migration of country people to cities to find employment. The discovery of new gold fields and the turning loose of great hoards of money in 1906-7 started up industries and gave these people work; the volume of money in actual circulation doubled, money became abundant, and prices of farm products rose, and have been rising, on the whole, ever since. Never before were American farmers more prosperous, and the outlook is for a long continuance of that prosperity."

Notice of Special Election for the City of Jacksonville, Oregon.

NOTICE is hereby given, that under and in pursuance of an ordinance of the City Council of the City of Jacksonville, Oregon, passed and approved on the 19th day of July, 1909, ordering a submission upon the legal voters of the said City of Jacksonville Ordinance No. 125, a copy of which is hereto attached and made a part hereof, passed by the said City Council, ordering and authorizing the issuance of bonds of the said City of Jacksonville in the sum of \$25,000.00 for the purpose of establishing a water system for the said city and for the purpose of furnishing water to the city, citizens and inhabitants of the City of Jacksonville, Oregon, a special election will be held within the corporate limits of the said City of Jacksonville, Oregon, at the City Hall thereof on the 17th day of August, 1909, between the hours of 10 o'clock A. M. and 4 o'clock P. M. of said date for the purpose of submitting to the qualified bond voters of the said City of Jacksonville, the question of whether the City Council of the City of Jacksonville, Oregon, shall issue bonds of the said City of Jacksonville, Oregon, for the purpose of establishing a water system for the said city and for the purpose of furnishing water to the city, citizens and inhabitants of the City of Jacksonville, Oregon. The estimated cost of the said water system is \$25,000.

Vote YES or NO. If in favor of bonds vote YES; if opposed vote NO.

CITY ORDINANCE, NO. 125.

An ordinance authorizing the city of Jacksonville, Oregon, to issue bonds of the City of Jacksonville, Oregon,

to the amount of Twenty Five Thousand Dollars, with interest thereon at the rate of five per cent per annum from the date of sale of the same, interest payable semi-annually, and providing for the time and manner of payment of the said bonds, and providing for a special election for submitting the question of the issuance of said bonds to the legal voters of the said City of Jacksonville, for the purpose of providing water for the use of the inhabitants of and citizens of and city of Jacksonville, Oregon.

The People of the City of Jacksonville do ordain as follows:

Section 1. That for the purpose of providing water for the use of the inhabitants of, citizens of, and City of Jacksonville, Oregon, and for the purpose of contracting for, constructing, maintaining, owning, managing and operating a system of water works with all the necessary implements and appliances for the purposes of supplying water to the City, citizens of and inhabitants of the City of Jacksonville, Ore., and for the purpose of buying, leasing, or contracting for property within or outside the said City of Jacksonville, Oregon, for the said purpose of constructing, maintaining, owning, managing and operating the said proposed system of water works, and for the purchase of all necessary implements and appliances for the supply of water to the said city, citizens and inhabitants of the said City of Jacksonville, Oregon, and for the purpose of contracting for, procuring and purchasing or otherwise obtaining for the said purpose of providing water for the use of the said city and the inhabitants and citizens thereof, the waters of any stream, spring or well, there is hereby authorized and ordered to be issued the bonds of the City of Jacksonville, Oregon, to the amount of twenty five thousand (\$25,000.00) Dollars, to be issued in denominations of Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars and shall be known as the Jacksonville, Oregon, Water Works Bonds and shall draw interest at the rate of Five per cent per annum, interest payable semi-annually.

Section 2. Said bonds shall be numbered from one to fifty and shall be issued in denominations of Five Hundred Dollars, and five thousand dollars in amount of said bonds shall become due and payable on the 10th day of October in each of the years 1914 and 1919, and \$7,500. of said bonds shall become due and payable in each of the years 1924 and 1929. And each and all of the bonds herein provided for to bear date October 10th 1909. And said bonds shall be payable at the office of the City Treasurer of Jacksonville, Oregon, in Jacksonville, Oregon, and shall be payable at the option of the City of Jacksonville, Oregon, at any time after October 10th, 1919.

Section 3. The bonds hereby authorized shall be substantially in the following form:

Know all men by these presents, that the City of Jacksonville, Oregon, for value received, acknowledges it owes and hereby promises to pay to the bearer the sum of Five Hundred Dollars in Gold Coin of the United States of America at the present standard of weight and fineness, upon the presentation and surrender of this bond on

the day of _____, 19____ due and payable absolutely on that date with interest thereon at the rate of Five per cent per annum, interest payable semi-annually in like coin on the day of _____ and on the day of _____ in each year,

upon presentation and surrender of the proper interest coupon annexed hereto as they respectively mature. This bond is one of a series of like bonds (excepting the date of maturity) numbered from one to fifty, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of Twenty Five Thousand Dollars, issued under and in pursuance of and in full compliance with the City Charter of the City of Jacksonville, Oregon, and of an election duly called and held on the 17th day of August, 1909. And it is hereby certified and recited that all acts, conditions and things required to be done and performed precedent to and in the issuance of said bonds, have been properly done, happened and performed in regular and due time, form and manner, as required by law; and that the total indebtedness of said City of Jacksonville, including this series of bonds, does not exceed the statutory or constitutional limitations; and for the punctual payment of the principal and interest of this bond, the faith and credit of the said City of Jacksonville are hereby irrevocably pledged.

In witness whereof this bond has been signed by the mayor and city recorder of the City of Jacksonville, Oregon, with the title of their respective offices affixed and under the seal of the said City of Jacksonville on this day of _____, 19____

The City of Jacksonville, Oregon, will pay to the bearer at the office of the city treasurer in Jacksonville, Oregon, \$12.50 in gold coin of the United States of America, at the present standard of weight and fineness, on the day of _____ and on the day of _____ being the semi-annual interest due on Jacksonville, Oregon, Water Works Bond No. _____

City Recorder Mayor.

Section 4. A special election in and for the said City of Jacksonville, is hereby directed, authorized and ordered to be held at the regular polling within the said City of Jacksonville, Oregon, at the City Hall on the 17th day of August, 1909, between the hours of 10 o'clock A. M. and 4 o'clock P. M. of said day, at which time there shall be submitted to the qualified bond voters of the said City of Jacksonville, Oregon the question of the issuance of the bonds herein provided for by the said City of Jacksonville, for the said purpose, and the bonds mentioned, provided for and described in section 3 of this ordinance shall not be issued until the same are authorized by a majority of the qualified bond voters within and of the said City of Jacksonville, and the City Recorder of said City of Jacksonville is hereby directed, authorized and ordered to publish a notice in The Jacksonville Post, for a period of not less than fifteen days prior to the date for holding the said special election, and it is hereby ordered that the said notice shall contain a statement of the object of the proposed issue of bonds and the estimated cost of the proposed system of water works, and a full copy of this ordinance.

Section 5. The City of Jacksonville, Oregon, has no system of water works or any supply of water for protection against fire and has no water to supply either to the City of Jacksonville, or to the citizens and inhabitants thereof, suitable for drinking or domestic purposes and has no supply of water what soever for any of said purposes. That the property belonging to the City of Jacksonville and to the inhabitants and citizens thereof is in constant peril from fire; and the health of the citizens of said City is in constant danger from the impure water which they are required to use and from the un-sanitary conditions which the present lack of water system entail upon the people of the City. That the health and safety of the City of Jacksonville demand the immediate passage and approval of this ordinance.

Section 6. Whereas the public health and safety of the City, citizens and inhabitants of the City of Jacksonville, Oregon, are imperilled by the lack of water system, and whereas the public health and safety are imperilled by any delay in the immediate passage, approval and immediate effect of this ordinance, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage by the required number of votes of this council and its approval by the mayor.
