### FAIR PLAY

The Tribune in a recent editorial sneeringly refers to certain decisions of the circuit court as "samples of Jackson county justice" and declares that "the public is becoming used to reversals of the local court." The article winds up with the statement that "the recall has been suggested as a remedy for present conditions".

The article in question is in bad taste to say the least and while the insinuations of unfairness will pass unnoticed by most residents of the county, strangers unacquainted with Judge Hanna, his reputation for fairness and his judicial ability, after reading the article might infer that it was next to impossible to get justice in the court and that Jackson county would be an undesirable place in which to live. As to the reversals: A judge is not infallible and is liable to err in the interpretation of the law, hence we have the supreme court. An examination of the records show that of the appeals taken to the supreme court from this county the decisions of Judge Hanna have in a large number of cases been affirmed, showing the soundness of his decisions, while the length of service and numerous re-elections thereto indicate the confidence which the people of Jackson county have in the ability and integrity of Judge Hanna.

The bond election passed off quietly, only a small vote being polled. The percentage in favor of bonds was larger than the friends of the measure claimed before the election was held. It had been figured by knowing ones that 15 persons would vote against the measure, but the returns show only 11, evidently the four changed their minds at the last minute. That's right brother, it is better late than never.

The legislature at the recent session passed an act requiring that the outer doors of all rooms or buildings used for public meetings, etc. be arranged to open outwards. The doors of the court house come under this act, also those of the different churches, public halls, lodge rooms, school houses, etc.

The Pe Ell Enterprise is the latest addition to our exchange list. Bro. Watson is to be congratulated upon the improvements made in the appearance and general get-up of the paper during the time he has conducted it.

The 48th annual State Fair will be held at Salem, September 13-18.

While Ashland is constructing electric street railways for the city it would be an easy matter to go a step farther, extend the line to Talent, then on to Phoenix, along the edge of the foothills to Jacksonville, sweeping around in a graceful curve to Central Point, thence to Medford, finally closing up the gap at Phoenix, and completely encircling the best part of the valley. Such a route is practicable and if built and put into operation the road would be a dividend payer from the start. The next five years will see such a road built and in successful operation.

Now that the financial end will be provided for, it is up to the council to give this city good water in sufficient quantity for all ordinary uses and at a reasonable rate. At the outset the income from the water cannot be expected to pay running expenses, interest, etc. but eventually the income from water rates should pay all expenses and yield a handsome dividend besides.

The people, by their vote Tuesday say that they want water, the town council are in favor of water, now let all pull together, let the public know we are alive, put in the best system possible, and see the town grow.

### Oregon Sidelights.

Dufur has used oil on its streets for several years.

La Grande is now entirely free from contagious diseases.

A Dutch flat firm ordered 10,000 apple trees at The Dalles.

Farmer near Salem sold 3000 bushels of oats at 45 cents a bushel net.

A thousand people have taken out fishing licenses in Umatilla county.

A Eugene cannery is shipping carloads of pickled cherries to New York.

An 80-acre hay ranch in Hood River Valley will yield \$3000 worth of clover and alfalfa.

An Acme man says most of the people over there are not in favor of the proposed new Pacific county.

Only one threshing machine has been blown up by smut in Umatilla county this year—less than usual.

One party of La Grande people picked 45 gallons of huckleberries in the mountains in four days.

A 10-stamp mill weighing 30 tons will be moved out from the Blue river district, partly through a country where there are no roads.

Boring for oil on a ranch south of Astoria continues in the second well, the first having been abandoned. The drill is down over 400 feet.

Dirt continues to fly on the construction of the Pacific & Eastern railroad beyond Eagle Point, some four miles having been graded and over a mile and a half of track laid.

Party of innocent automobile tourists from California, three men and one woman, were arrested by the sheriff at Roseburg for horsestealing at Grants Pass, and after considerable detention released.

A Glendale correspondent says that many visitors from various localities are arriving every day to enjoy the healthful climate, pure mountain water and to go deep hunting in the neighboring glens.

A splendid harvest is predicted by the Corvallis Gazette-Times. There has been an urgent demand for labor and it is not uncommon to see women and children as young as 10 helping in the work. One great new crop is kale that produce heads on a single stalk weighing as high as 100 pounds.

The Dallas Optimist: A Washtucna hen laid 11 eggs in 6 days, says the Spokane Spokesman-Review. That is nothing. Every hen in Rabbitville lays three eggs every day and four on Sundays. That can be proved by every citizen of that town.

A Wisconsin paper having boasted of a cherry tree yielding 100 quarts, the Medford Tribune says: "There is a tree near Eagle Point which this year produced 98 gallons or 392 quarts. Likewise there is a tree near Gold Hill which produced 200 gallons or 800 quarts."

Skowhegan, Maine, Aug. 14.—The twenty-second child, a daughter, has been born to Mr. and Mrs. Charles Dickey of Canaan. The couple have been married 27 years. They are all living in Canaan. The oldest one is 25 years old.—Ex.
