

PORTLAND LETTER

Oregon Conservation Commission Meets August 30-- Flour and cereal mill to cost \$1,000,000--Joy riders under ban--Undertakers Convention September 28 October 2--Contract let to double track Northern Pacific.

Portland, Ore., Aug. 17, (Special.) The conservation of Ore., resources will be discussed fully at Portland by the Oregon Conservation Commission, which will hold its convention on August 30, Gifford Pinchot, head of the forestry service, will be the principal speaker and will discuss the various phases of conservation in Oregon. He is thoroughly familiar with the situation here, having studied it in connection with his forestry work.

Since the commission was organized much has been accomplished in protecting natural resources. Water power, timber and land have been saved to the state. It is expected that much good will result in furthering this work by the forthcoming convention. Citizens from the whole state are invited to attend.

Work has been started in Portland on what will be the biggest and most complete cereal mill on the Coast. The mill is being built by Albers Bros. and will be located on the river front, where additional property for the purpose was recently purchased. When complete, the plant will represent an outlay of \$1,000,000. It is expected the plant will be ready for operation this winter.

Joy riders have been put under the ban by the Portland Automobile Club, and steps were taken at a meeting held this week to do away with reckless motorists. Recent killings by autos on speedways about the city by the class of drivers known as joy riders have caused the Automobile Club to start a campaign to restrict dare-devil automobile speeding. Resolutions were passed at the meeting and members of the club are going to do everything they can to put a stop to speeding on public roads.

During late September and early October, Portland will be the scene of the greatest gathering of undertakers ever held in America. It will be the occasion of the annual convention of the National Funeral Directors' Association, in conjunction with which will be held the annual conventions of the Oregon and Washington state associations. September 28, 29 and 30th and October 1 and 2 are the dates set for three conventions. This will be the first time the national convention has been held on the Pacific Coast. Preparations have been made to give the visitors a warm reception. They will be dined at the Commercial Club, formally welcomed to the city by the Mayor and the Club officials, and taken about Portland and up the Columbia river for sight-seeing trips.

Contracts were let during the past week for double tracking the Northern Pacific main line between Kalama and Tacoma. The additional track is being laid to provide for the common use of the Northern Pacific line by the Union Pacific between Portland and the Puget Sound cities. The work is expected to be completed within six months at a cost of about \$1,600,000.

General News.

The thermometer registered 99 degrees at Omaha, Neb. Saturday, the hottest in three years.

The Pennsylvania railroad has placed an order for 8000 new freight cars to cost about \$800,000.

A convict who entered the Kansas state prison 16 years ago has just been discharged with a fortune of \$6,500.

H. C. Thurston of Mt. Vernon, Texas claims to be the tallest living veteran of the civil war. He is 7 feet 7 inches in height and weighs 221 pounds.

Mr. and Mrs. A. Stewart, owners of the "House of Folly" at Waitsburg, were placed under the care of a guardian at Walla Walla, Wash. Saturday.

Seven deaths and eighteen serious prostrations was the record of the heat in St. Louis, Saturday. The present hot wave is the most serious in eight years.

Eddie Wright, six years old, shot and instantly killed his playmate Willie Smith at Mascumb, Miss. last week. The boys were playing "war" with an old gun supposed to be "not loaded".

Over half a million acres of land in California, Montana and Washington, formerly withdrawn in connection with reclamation projects, has been restored to entry subject to settlement in November.

Eight persons were killed and fifty-four injured in a head-on collision of the Denver and Rio Grande R. R. near Colorado Springs, Saturday morning. The collision was caused by the conductor disobeying orders.

Sam Smith, facing a score of charges for burglary, was sentenced to five hours in the penitentiary and to pay a fine of \$500, at Cheyenne, Wyo. Saturday. Smith has passed the last year in jail and the hospital awaiting trial. His sentence is the shortest ever imposed in Wyoming.

News of the State

Joshua Ballard, was fined \$50, and costs at Albany, Saturday morning, for selling liquor without license.

Arthur Anderson, of Portland was crushed between two logs and instantly killed at Clatskanie, Saturday.

Willis Van Horn sold an 80 acre orchard in Hood River last week, to H. C. Peters of Cincinnati, Ohio, for \$64,000.

Albert S. Miller, aged 88 years, died at St. Marie's hospital in Albany, Saturday. He was a native of Massachusetts.

The mill of the Middleton Lumber Co. at Middleton Oregon was totally destroyed by fire last week, loss about \$25,000. The company will rebuild at once.

Andrew Hale, an eccentric old man living alone near Sodaville, committed suicide by hanging himself to the limb of a tree, last week. He was 77 years old and reported rich.

Seven Greek laborers, arrested last week at Cottage Grove, charged with robbing a boxcar on the S. P. sidetrack, plead guilty and were fined \$60, apiece. The value of the goods stolen was about \$10.

Rector A. Johnson, aged 32 years a prominent business man of Marshfield, was found dead Friday night within three blocks of his home. Mystery surrounds the case. The coroner's jury brought in a verdict of suicide but friends of the young man believe that he was murdered.

Charity Versus Justice.

Charity is that high morality, which is the "science of minimizing human misery." Religion is the root of the tree of life. Charity or social service must be in its fruit.
